From the Pastor's Pen

Last year for Christmas, my mom gave me a book entitled, “A Father’s Legacy.” When I opened it, I found the pages nearly blank. “Finally,” I thought, “My kind of book!” Upon further examination, I realized it was a guided journal...the kind with questions at the top of each page for me to answer, about twenty questions/pages each month. The idea is to complete it in a year so that at years end, you have an autobiography of sorts to pass on to your children. With one month left to go...amazingly, so far, so good!

The question from the other day asked, “What Christmas traditions did you enjoy as a child?” This brought back many great memories.

As you’ve likely heard me say, my dad was the eleventh of twelve children who, along with nearly all their children and grandchildren, lived their whole lives in my hometown. In my growing up, holidays always meant family—lots of family.

On Christmas Eve, following the candlelight service at church, we all gathered at my Aunt Ruth’s home until late into the evening to visit and laugh and play games and eat. Aunt Ruth lived in a large, old “city” house, and that night it was packed with people...family...and love.

The morning of Christmas Day was always spent at home, but in the afternoon, the Diddle family gathered again, this time at my Aunt Mary’s home...to eat together and enjoy each other. As I grew into my teens, the younger cousins began to leave Mary’s in the late afternoon, moving their party to my cousin Jeff’s home for a few evening hours. In some ways we had to split up a bit...it’s hard to fit 75 people in about 800 square feet.



On the afternoon of the day after Christmas, the family gathered again at my Uncle Ray’s home, often watching old family movies of other holiday gatherings (the all-time favorite being an Independence Day picnic at Guilford Lake where my Uncle Harold appeared to shine his bald head with his handkerchief, but we all starred in them at one time or another). That same evening the family moved the party to my Aunt Delma’s home. They lived near a pond, and I can remember skating there, snowball fights, sledding, and hikes in the snow. We told stories of times past...the very same stories over and over again.

This is all very fresh in my mind these days, not only because of the journaling I’m doing, but because many of the people and places in these memories are disappearing. Most of my aunts and uncles have passed on. Aunt Ruth’s home has been sold. Aunt Mary’s caught fire this fall and was irreparably damaged. So the memories are all that’s left, but they’re enough.

As I answered the journal question about traditions and memories, another question came to mind: “What am I doing to create traditions and equally great memories for my children?”

I’ve suggested to Annette the option of recreating a family of twelve; she wasn’t so sure about that. I realize, though, that even if we did, in our age of change and mobility, the dynamic would never be the same.

The solution for us has been...well...you...the family of the Church. Our children’s memories of holidays will center around the life and times of WFMC—your involvement in our lives, your faith, your presence around the tables, your stories of traditions and memories. This is true not just for us, but for so many in Wilmore who follow God’s call far from what they’ve known as home. We’re all important to each other...this is the church being the church.

So, thank you, for the good times past and those yet to come. We’re making memories for one another.

Q & A on Prayer

Q: How can we tell the difference between answers to prayer and coincidence?

A: We can't scientifically prove that God has acted. God's method of drawing us to Himself is not to present us with a series of miracles that no reasonable person could deny. Events happen because of natural processes, because of the decisions of others, and because God is interacting with us. These factors are entangled, and we can't always say for certain what is due to divine providence, but through faith we can often discern God's action in this world.

Q: Since God knows what is best, why does He wait for prayers and not just get on with it?

A: God is not an indifferent or lazy Spectator, needing us to prod Him into action. He doesn't need us to suggest cunning plans He would not have thought of without our help. At the other extreme, God is not a Puppet Master, pulling all the strings. God is Love. He invites us to pray and places value on our prayers in His efforts for us to grow in love with Him.

Q: Does my little prayer actually do anything?

A: Yes. In creation, God has reserved for Himself a significant degree of power to bring about the future. He has also given us, His creatures, lesser powers to affect the future. Can simple love change anything? Yes. How could the love we feel for others not help? Often, as we pray, we are inspired to do something more for our neighbors. Sometimes further action is impossible yet, mysteriously, love expressed through prayer, changes the future.

Q: How is prayer like a laser?

A: Laser light is powerful because it is focused. The light waves line up so that the crests are all together and the troughs are all together. In regular light, the crests and troughs can coincide and cancel each other out. It is incoherent. That is why regular light doesn't cut through metal. Prayer is lining up the human will with the divine will. This focusing is powerful, especially when many people are praying about the same thing.

Q: Does scripture support this idea?

A: Yes. We are told that Jesus did few miracles in His hometown because of unbelief (Mark 6:5). In the Gospels, Jesus' acts of healing required the trust of those seeking healing. God limits Himself in His desire to collaborate with us.


Q: Is prayer like a blank check?

A: No, God is not just a jolly Santa in the sky, but neither are we just victims of fate. We don't need to just shut up and put up with whatever comes our way. We are called to pray. Although we don't know exactly how God will answer us, we know that God is listening, and God is love.

Q: What do you want?

A: When Jesus met the blind man outside of Jericho, Jesus asked Him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The man answered, "My teacher, let me see again," and then he was healed. Today, imagine that you feel Jesus' warm breath near your ear and that you hear His voice whispering, "What do you want me to do for you?" Today, He invites you to pray.

Chelsea entered a one-year Teen Challenge recovery and life-skills program that changed her life direction. She graduated from the program last May, began a responsible job at Office Depot in June, and is now a department manager. She attends “Celebrate Recovery” meetings every Thursday and church services every Sunday and is pursuing a plan to regain custody of her six-year-old son. Thanks to my friends at Grandparents Who Pray, I am confident of her continued success. No longer hopeless, she proudly wears a T-shirt proclaiming her status as a “Dopeless Hope Addict.”




Book Review

Singled Out: Why Celibacy Must Be Reinvented in Today's Church by Christine Colon and Bonnie Field (2009).

Redeeming Singleness: How the Storyline of Scripture Affirms the Single Life by Barry Danylak.



While gathering information to write a book for single missionaries, I talked with several of them. These two recent books were repeatedly recommended by these singles, and I found both books to be excellent.



Both books realistically

address sensitive issues, assume a Biblical perspective, and maintain that both marriage and singleness are good. The authors do not devalue marriage but emphasize that celibacy is a valid option for Christians—remember that Christ was single Himself. *Singled Out* is an “easier read” and a bit more practical, but *Redeeming Singleness* develops a fuller theology of singleness.

I recommend both books not only for singles but also for anyone interested in ministry to singles. In the United Kingdom there are already more single adults than married ones, and in another year or two, that will be the case in the USA. The church often assumes that marriage is the norm, but soon married individuals will be in the minority. Our identity is not in our marital status or our season of life, but in being brothers and sisters in Christ. We have all been singles, at least as younger adults, and more than half of us who are now married will be singles again as older adults.
