Seeking the Face of God: Revive Us Again

We look forward to Dr. Clarence Bence leading our spring renewal series, March 3rd through 6th. Please set these days aside as a special opportunity for you, personally, and for us as a church family, to hear a new word from the Lord. He will always honor the time we give to Him in expectation.

A little about Dr. Bence (or, "Bud," as he prefers to be known):

Dr. Bence spent his childhood in upstate New York, where his father pastored a Wesleyan Church and served as district superintendent. After studies at Houghton College and Asbury Seminary, he pastored a Wesleyan Church in Rochester, N.Y., where he developed a large youth program and church open to the "Jesus Movement" of the early 1970s. Bud also has a degree in Historical Theology from Emory University, and was twice a research fellow at the World Institute of Methodist Studies, Oxford University. He is ordained in the Wesleyan Church (1970).



For the majority of his ministerial career, Dr. Bence has devoted himself to teaching in Wesleyan colleges, joining the faculty of Indiana Wesleyan University (IWU) in 1982. He has received awards for "excellence in teaching" and has been honored as "professor of the year" by the students. He is currently Church Historian in Residence and Professor at Wesley Seminary at IWU. In addition to speaking frequently at summer camps and on college campuses, Dr. Bence has authored a commentary on the book of Romans, and was also one of the editors for the NIV Study Bible.

Dr. Bence loves church history and coffee. He usually teaches his courses first thing in the morning, so he needs that coffee to keep awake...and so do his students. His wife, Carol, was a faculty member at Indiana Wesleyan in the nursing division for 12 years, ultimately serving as the assistant director of the RNBS program in nursing for Indiana Wesleyan's College of Adult & Professional Studies. The Bences have three grown children. For hobbies, Bud enjoys carpentry and gardening. In 2003, Dr. and Mrs. Bence took a sabbatical leave to Southeast Asia where they taught in a mission school and lectured to pastors and their wives in India, Myanmar and Cambodia.

We Are What We Eat

In her interest in trying (usually futilely) to curb my appetite for junk food, I remember my mother telling me more than once, "You are what you eat." I also remember my mother's mother saying that from time to time too, so Mom came by the phrase honestly. Of course, it's not just what you eat that you become. Technically, it's what you take into your body or what you expose yourself to the most. We're like chameleons in that way. Granted, it doesn't happen as quickly with us, but it happens none the less – we become like what we "feed" upon.

What reasonable person would give time and attention and adoration to inanimate things that cannot even respond, let alone act of their own accord?

Second, the psalmist notes how ridiculous it is for people to worship these *things* by pointing out their sheer helplessness. What reasonable person would give time and attention and adoration to inanimate things that cannot even respond, let alone act of their own accord? Who in their right mind would worship something that their own hands have made? The lesson should be, "If I made it, I have more power than it does, so why would I elevate it over myself.

The third warning is the reminder that "Those who make them will be like them," or, "You are what you eat." We become what we worship, what we give our time and attention and love to.

Now, most of us would quickly admit,

"I worship God exclusively." Like a kindergartener answering every question with "Jesus!" We know that is the right answer.

In what do we invest the majority of our attention and time and, frankly, love? What thing? What cause? What pastime? What job? What hobby or pursuit?

Are we worshipping it?

Are we becoming like it?

The answer to the last question, according to the Psalmist, is, "Yes, we are becoming like it," whether we see it or not...whether we want to admit it or not.

No matter which channel we watch, if we let the news programs speaking of the crises of our day define and overwhelm our time with the Lord in prayer and worship and our personal reading and study of Scripture, what are we truly worshipping? What are we becoming?

The Psalmist reminds us of this truth in chapter 135, verse 15:

The idols of the nations are silver and gold, made by human hands. They have mouths, but cannot speak, eyes but they cannot see; they have ears, but cannot hear, nor is there breath in their mouths. Those who make them will be like them, and so will all who trust in them.

It's a warning on many levels.

First, it's a reminder of the reality that the world around us idolizes physical "things" that are not God. Since humans are created with an innate need to worship, humanity always has some supreme "thing" that it worships. These *things*...these objects of worship... have changed form through time, taking varying shapes, from carved statues of old, to today's houses and cars. Of course, the one, consistent always-in-vogue object of worship is the person himself or herself.

It really is true, "We are what we eat." We become what we take into ourselves. We resemble that to which we give our time and thought and attention.

ately. But there is no cause, no thing, no one more important and more worthy of worship than the one true God.

We resemble that to which we give our time and thought and attention.

Certainly there are causes and crises in our world worthy of our concern. Certainly we give ourselves to our family and work, and we care for ourselves appropri-

Our worship, and the object of our worship, shapes us. In whom or what are we investing our love and attention and trust? Who or what are we becoming? "We are what we eat."



Book Reviews


The Rise and Fall of Kidsborian Empire By Marshal Younger

In the ten fascinating chapters written by Marshal Younger, The Rise and Fall of Kidsborian Empire is about a neighborhood in a town called Odyssey ruled only by kids! The neighborhood is called Kidsboro. The kids run Kidsboro pretty well. In Kidsboro, they've got a police station, a church, a newspaper, a court, a golf course, a movie theater, and even a bank (Kidsboro uses fake money)! When there is trouble, the "city council members", who are Ryan, Scott, Nelson, Alice, and Jill, always figure out a way to solve the problem. However, there was trouble that came to Kidsboro in the book that they didn't even notice. Read on to find out how they solved the problem.

It was just a normal day at Kidsboro until Jake Randall came and changed everything. He started causing trouble by forcing Ryan (the "mayor" of Kidsboro) to let him become a citizen. Then he sues Nelson by tricking everybody that he had tripped on one of Nelson's creations, a special type of remote-controlled car. Worst of all, he stole all of the money from Kidsboro's bank. Then Ryan and Jill figured out that Jake really didn't trip on the cars. Finally, with Alice's help they got Jake to court. In the end, they banned Jake from Kidsboro.

What I learned from this book is that you can't always do things on your own. For example, in the beginning Ryan tried to solve the problem by himself. However, it didn't work. The "city council members" had to work together to solve the problem. We always need help and we can always help one another, too.



Life with Lily By Mary Ann Kinsinger and Suzanne Woods Fisher

Life with Lily is a fiction book of 276 pages. It is the first in a series of three books. The story takes place in upstate New York and Kentucky.



Lily Lapp, the main character, has to learn how to deal with the big changes in her life. First, Lily's mom has another baby boy. She is happy about the baby, but not thrilled about her mom spending a lot of time with him. Soon her great-grandma gets sick. Lily is scared that great-grandma might not get better. Next, Lily starts school. Lily's first teacher, Ellen, is very nice and Ellen likes her a lot. Unfortunately, Ellen gets in a wreck and is unable to teach. Lily's new teacher, Katie, is very strict and mean. Lily does not like her at all! After school ends, Lily finds out that her family will be moving to Kentucky. Lily does not want to move and leave her friends.

I learned more about the Amish life and culture by reading this book. For instance: they do not use electricity or cars. They are hard workers and live on farms. I found their lifestyle interesting. There is a constant mention of all their chores including tending to the garden, helping out with horses, cooking baked goods to sell, doing the washing, cleaning the kitchen, and much more!

This is a well written book. I think that kids ages 8 to 10 would enjoy reading this book and learning about the Amish. I am definitely looking forward to reading the next book in the series!

Consider This

The Homeward Direction

Sylvia and I have been reacquainting ourselves this past year with E. Stanley Jones - largely through his classic work The Way. Though Jones wrote over 65 years ago, his thoughts could not be more contemporarily relevant. Perhaps that's largely because of his great confidence in prayer and in the God who answers when we pray.

Jones reminds us, "It is so easy to get lost in the world. I come to the prayer hour to find myself and my directions again. Prayer is the period of circling, like a homing pigeon, to gain a homeward direction. To prayer we come, turning round and round on ourselves. Then from prayer we go with the homeward direction in the heart. The wings no longer hesitate, for the heart is sure."

In another place he tells of an artist who kept a collection of precious stones of many colors beside him as he worked. When asked why, the artist replied, "I have to wash out my eyes constantly in the colors of nature." Jones reflected, "These colors clarified his colors. When I look at Jesus, a sense of the worthwhile comes upon me. I wash out my eyes in His colors. I look into the face of Jesus, and when I do, I know I must wash my own face, my heart, my life."

When we see Jesus in prayer we find ourselves and true Life as in no other way -- and we know our homeward direction and our wings without hesitation.
