# On Leaving Church

Recently, a year-old blog post by Bill Muehlenberg was forwarded to me entitled, "On Leaving Church." (You'll find a link to it in the News section of our church website.) It describes a growing segment of Christians, primarily in the West, who no longer participate in a local church body. They've not

given up on God or faith or Jesus or even Christian fellowship, but on going to church. They are the "Dones;" as in, "done" with organized church.

Why is this happening? Muehlenberg cites the comments of sociologist Josh Packard in answering, "After sitting through countless sermons and Bible studies, they feel they've heard it all. One interviewee said, 'I'm tired of being lectured to. I'm just done with having some guy tell me what to do.' They're fatigued by the Sunday routine of plop, pray and pay. They want to play. They want to participate. But they feel spurned at every turn."

Muehlenberg then offers his own assessment of why the ranks of the "Dones" are increasing. These believers are:

- 1. Growing tired of the celebrity culture in our churches preachers and leaders that see themselves as "above" others.
- 2. Fed up with the incessant entertainment and worldly amusements found in the churches.
- 3. Not being fed from the Word of God.
- 4. Put off by the attempt to cater solely to youth, while ignoring their needs.
- 5. Tired of just being bench warmers, with no role to play. They are disappointed by a church culture where only the most trained and talented ever get to speak, sing, lead, teach, govern, create, or actually engage and serve.
- 6. Weary of the constant need to be "relevant" at the expense of biblical orthodoxy.
- 7. Looking for a real deal encounter with almighty God, not just a razzmatazz, sharply and timely done stage production.
- 8. Desiring genuine Holy Spirit revival, not just pep talks, self-help seminars, and a me-centered gospel.
- 9. Starving for the reality and authenticity of first century Christianity.

I get this, particularly in relation to today's contemporary church. In a church culture where very little is expected of the congregation; where the laity are simply expected to pay professionals to do the ministry of the church – everything from teaching to music to nursery; where the church has bought into our culture's consumer mentality; I certainly understand why people would feel this way. I would feel that way.

Muehlenberg's list of nine items are the responsibility of the organized church to avoid. If a local church is guilty of these, it's the church leadership's problem to repair.

I'd like to respond to each item regarding how I think our church stacks up in these areas and what we're intentionally doing to avoid these errors and bad practices.

1. Celebrity culture of leaders. My hope and prayer is that neither I, nor any of our leaders, are seen as Prima Donna celebrities. Truth be known, speaking only for myself, I often struggle with feelings of Continued on page 2

Continued from page 1 inadequacy and unworthiness to do what God has called me to do. Years ago, I took, and continue daily to take, the mantle of leadership very reluctantly, not so much by choice, but because I was asked to do so. I think most of our leaders feel the same about their leadership, which is healthy.

- 2. Church entertainment and amusement. I don't think we practice this. Anything we do as a church, whether in corporate worship or in some other venue, is designed for spiritual purposes. I don't see us as being entertaining just for the sake of getting a laugh.
- 3. Fed from God's Word. From my perspective, all of our classes take this seriously, as do I and all who speak from our pulpit. Our teaching is Bible-centered.
- 4. Catering to youth. If we were guilty of this, I'd think that at least our budget and our worship services would look very different than what they do. We are intentionally inter-generational. If anything, our attention to youth and their interests and preferences may need to increase.
- 5. Believers as bench warmers. One of our core values as a church is to provide places for every person to use their gifts in joyful service. Currently, we have over 300 people involved in music ministry of some kind; nearly 60 in teaching roles; another 75 or so in assimilation and care; nearly 130 serving in children's ministry; several dozen in youth ministry; and probably 60 engaged in facility care of some sort. We have nearly 40 persons elected to church leadership positions, not including staff. We have about 65 Team Leaders, all laity, leading teams ranging from Marriage to Hospital Visitation to Communion Stewards to World Missions to Panera Bread pickup to Coffee Preparation to Rest Home and Prison Ministry. We also always have dozens of places where volunteers are needed. From my perspective, there is never a need to default to "bench warmer" status here. If a person wants to serve, there are many, many places to do so.
- 6. Relevant at the expense of Biblical truth. I hope I, and all who teach, are both. Honestly, I don't see how anyone who teaches in church can be one without the other. The two must go together, or the church is not effective.
- 7. Real deal encounter with God. Amen to this. We get there through prayer, not through productions designed simply to evoke emotion. Stage shows may result in emotion, but it may not necessarily be God-induced. I believe what we do and how we lead worship is honest and genuine. I wish and pray that God would come in more powerful ways in our midst. Personally, I find that when I'm best prepared for worship, God seems closer. Maybe if we all prayed and prepared thoughtfully...intentionally to worship, God would seem closer to us all.
- 8. Pep talks. This is funny to me because I've actually been accused of not being encouraging enough, of addressing too many hard subjects, of issuing too many personal, spiritual challenges, and giving a too pessimistic outlook on our cultural future, so I don't know that we fall down here. If anything, I may need to swing my preaching more this way a bit. I'm sure I miss it from time to time, but my intent is to realistically apply Scripture to what's happening in the world around us, so we can live in peace with ourselves, one another, and God.
- 9. Longing for true community. This is about opportunity for true fellowship: life to life sharing, upbuilding, and committed relationships, and I think this may be the most challenging thing for today's churches to know how to encourage and provide. The church cannot be a "dating" service, so in one sense, people's ability to connect meaningfully with one another must be self-motivated and self-driven, and in our increasingly non-social culture, more and more people don't seem to know how to initiate true connections and friendships. Yet the church must encourage and help provide structures for this. This is probably the item on which your church staff spends more time than any other, and we're not succeeding to the degree we'd like.

Please don't read defensiveness into any of these comments. I'm not intending that tone or tenor here. And, I'm sure other reasons for a rise in the "dones" could be added to this list. I'm simply responding to these in an effort to not be the kind of church from which people drop away due to lack of interest, use, or investment. I want to do all we can, from the church leadership perspective, to keep that from happening.

Now, from a pastoral perspective, I might add a tenth reason to Muehlenberg's list of why the "Dones" are a growing population – a reason that falls on the individual and not on the church, and that is, simply put, personal busy-ness, poor priorities, or even laziness...giving in to our baser nature to let others do for us.

This is something about which church leadership can do little more than warn. It's easy to let every other priority in life take the place of church engagement. We can elevate family time, work, leisure, and hobbies to such a place that leaves no time for church. This is nothing that can be evaluated by anyone but ourselves and God's Spirit's voice in our quiet moments with Him, but investment always requires something – there is always a cost.

# Dr. Terry Faris, speaker

Rev. Terry Faris is a Kentucky native, born in Maysville. He's been married to his wife, Judy, a retired middle school teacher, since 1968. They have two daughters, Tracy (Rexford) and Lori (Fitch), and four grand-daughters, who all currently live in Wilmore.

Terry is a graduate of both Asbury University and Asbury Seminary. He enjoys fishing, tennis, mountain biking, history, and foreign languages.

Terry committed his life to Christ as a sophomore in high school, and began preaching soon afterward, taking his first pastoral appointment in 1964, beginning 44 years of

pastoral ministry all over the state of Kentucky. He also served as District Superintendent for the Corbin District of the Kentucky Conference of the United Methodist Church. Terry retired in 2008 and now lives in Wilmore.

# The Priority of Prayer and Prayer's Priorities

We humans are in the most wonderful situation imaginable. Our great God has given each of us an existence. We have been given life, and life is undeniably an amazing gift. We have a long, long list of enjoyable things such as growing up, learning so many things, playing, interacting with friends, loving others, being loved by others, seeing the world around us both near and far, discovering how things work, solving problems, developing our talents, cooperating to accomplish goals, etc., etc.,...the list goes on and on. Life was made to be very enjoyable and fulfilling. God has made tre-

mendous amounts of things for us to enjoy. Our amazing God wants us

to enjoy life to its fullest.

However, God wants to enjoy us as well. He wants to establish a relationship, a long-lasting, never-ceasing relationship with each of us. But, we were born with a sin nature. Self-centeredness has led us into a life of sinfulness, and our continual sins have made us filthy in our holy Creator's sight. Absolutely, under no circumstances will God, Who hates sin and Who cannot sin, tolerate our sins. We can only ever have fellowship with Him if we are like Him, that is, if we are clean and pure So. Go

Luke 19:10 teaches us that the Father sent Jesus to "seek and save" everyone who is lost. The word "seek" does not mean that men are where God doesn't know they are, and Jesus came to locate them. No, the seeking has to do with God's most earnest desire to establish a relationship with every individual person, if we will agree.

But people love sinning; often belligerent, obstinate, and determined to go our own way. Anyone who won't change, will, unavoidably, be forever separated from the God Who loves us. Neither sin nor any sinful being will ever enter into the holy place where God dwells.

Jesus came, suffered, bled, and died to save and cleanse every person. After completing His great work, He ascended back into God's Presence in Heaven. But it is His desire that the "seeking" continue, through us as His presence on earth. He has commissioned us as His disciples to continue this most important work (Matt 28: 18-20). But along with the telling, preaching, teaching, and walking out of God's Truth, God desires that we pray for the lost (I Tim. 2: 1-4). God is not willing that even one person should perish but that all should be saved. But, in partnership with God, it is

But, in partnership with God, it is extremely important that we pray for those who do not know Christ. extremely important that we pray for those who do not know Christ. It is God's way to reach them, that they may be convicted of their sins, repent and be saved.

Jesus came to seek and save the lost. Before He ascended back to Heaven, He instructed that his followers were to tell the world about His great work of creating an incredible path so that all can reach Heaven. But the Bible also states that we must pray. If the Lord states that the most important thing to Him is the salvation of His cre-

ated beings, then it follows that the most important prayer that should be offered is the prayer for the salvation of precious souls of the lost. John Wesley said that "God does nothing except in answer to prayer".

An example of the efficacy of prayer is the prayers of my mother for her brother, Paul. Paul, though brought up in the church, resisted the Lord throughout his life. He worked very hard and became quite wealthy. But all attempts to bring him to a relationship with Christ failed, He rejected them time and time again. Eventually, he had "more money than he could ever spend." His body weakened. He had to have oxygen. His wife passed away. One Sunday morning, his birthday, he awoke and suddenly decided that he would go to church for the first time in many years. He locat-

ed the church and as he sat and listened, God moved on his heart and answered 50 to 60 years of prayers. He proceeded to confess his sins and allowed the Lord to save Him.

When he returned home, he called my mother who was living several states away. His first words were, "Lorraine, I know where I'm going when I die." This sudden and strange comment from her supposedly ever-unreachable brother surprised and startled her. But as she talked to him, she began to realize he had truly repented and given his heart to the Lord. Of course, her joy could know no limit.

Uncle Paul not only was saved, but he set out to serve the Lord like few others. He traveled across the country to tell those he knew about the love and salvation of Jesus. He served in the church in every way possible. He dreamed up ways to get tiny tools made that would tell others of the love of Jesus. At his funeral, his pastor stated that in 30 years of pastoring, he had never seen anyone who was a better example of what a Christ-follower should be than Uncle Paul was. When Uncle Paul began his relationship with God, he really went deep with the Lord. Prayer was vital in his salvation. What a tragedy if my mother would have given up on praying for Uncle Paul!

Prayer, continual communication with God, is a priority in our relationship with Him, and when we pray, prayer for the lost is the priority over all other prayers that we might offer. May the Lord help us to be the best prayer warriors we can be!


# 2015-16 Prime Timer's Project

# **CONTRUCTION PLANNING TEAM UPDATE**

For the first time we are able to see the end of the tunnel in our first phase construction project. This time it is not a train coming toward us!

At the printing of this *Plumbline* issue we should have begun the process of moving in to our new building. Praise be to God! As in all construction projects there will be some punch list minor

interior issues to resolve.

Most of the excavation work around the new building and the new passenger drop off drive will be completed during the coming warmer weather.

Once we receive the Certificate of Occupancy for building B renovation work will commence on the sanctuary building.



The renovation work will require patience from all the next few months.

The classrooms and nursery will be relocated in building B. Existing classroom walls will be demolished and the nursery will be reconfigured for the new reception area and staff offices.

We have been informed by our general contractor that

the sanctuary building remodeling phase

will take four months.....if we do not experience any more *light in the end of the tunnel* issues!
