From the Pastor's Pen

A memorable and historical weekend - that's what last weekend was. As I write this, over the period of just a couple days, two very different crowds occupied the Mall in our nation's capital.

The first crowd - at least the vast majority of it - gathered to celebrate the inauguration of our new president, Donald Trump.

The second crowd gathered to, more or less, denounce that same inauguration.

I'd like to make a couple comments about all this, boldly going where angels fear to tread, some might think. But hang with me here.

First of all, let me say how glad I am to live in this country, where both crowds are allowed to gather and express their views. In these past months, we've heard many people - celebrities particularly - threaten to leave the United States should Donald Trump be elected president, but you can be sure that very, very few, if any, will do so...and here's why: assemble a large, vocal crowd, especially a dissenting crowd, in most nations of our world today and you'll quickly see how special the United States is. So, regardless of our opinion about either group and their cause, we can all celebrate their freedom to express themselves.

I think it's worth noting, too, that, when you look at a crowd like the ones most of us saw on the news, we tend to think of it as one, homogeneous group, meaning, we assume everyone there is there for the same reasons and think alike. That is not the case.

Certainly, most people in the inauguration crowd were there in support of Mr. Trump. I think it's safe to assume, however, that some were there just because they wanted to see a presidential...any presidential...inauguration. Some there likely agreed completely with Mr. Trump and with all of his perspectives and policies. Others maybe appreciated his views on some issues, but not others. We know too that some were there to protest the person or the inauguration or both. A few may have been simply walking across the Mall, or touring D.C., and wound up in the midst of the Friday's inaugural crowd.

The same might be said for the Saturday crowd too. Most were likely there in support of the anti-Trump cause. Others perhaps focused in on just one or two elements they found distasteful. Surely there were also at least a few Trump supporters there, protesting the protesters. There may also have been the stray tourist or simply people just curious about what all was going on. (Along these lines, I will admit, as David Adesnik observes, "the legions of Christian conservatives who opposed Trump in the Republican primary might well have been prepared to march for women's dignity and against sexual harassment had their path not been blocked well before the March, when its organizers made clear that pro-life groups were not welcome. In the words of national co-chair Linda Sarsour, "If you want to come to the march you are coming with the understanding that you respect a woman's right to choose.")

All this to say...crowds are never homogeneous units. Within a crowd of hundreds of thousands, you can be sure there are dozens of combinations of views and opinions represented. So it's just as impossible for anyone to conclude, "Because Joe went to the inauguration, he must love everything about our new president," as it is to conclude that, "Because Jane went to the women's march she must be a raging, anti-male, abortion-loving, liberal."

No one can really make those assessments about someone else just because they participated in a crowd. You wouldn't have to look hard to find people who attended the inauguration simply because they were in Washington at the time and wanted to see the spectacle. There were also women who marched, not because they are pro-abortion, but because they resented Trump's repulsive comments about his dealings with the fairer sex. So we all should use great care in our automatic deductions of others' intentions.

And yet, Christians must also use great care in the kinds of personalities to which we attach ourselves. Some marchers who find Trump's comments about, and treatment of, women offensive (and I might add, Christians absolutely should find it offensive), should also find the comments, signs, threats and vulgarity of march leaders and participants like Michael Moore, Madonna, and Ashley Judd, equally offensive. *(continued on page 2)*

I mean really...who among us seriously believes that Madonna should be a role model for young women or has, herself, taken a stand for gender equality? It is neither honest nor consistent to attack one morally corrupt person while standing arm in arm with someone else who is equally morally corrupt.

The fact is, the answer to our nation's ills will not be found in Donald Trump, any more than they'll be found in Madonna or Ashley Judd. No march or campaign slogan or sign ever did much to change human behavior and opinion. They may make their participants feel good...perhaps feel as though they've been involved and accomplished something. But typically spectacles are quickly forgotten and serve only to deepen already deep divides.

Real change is found in one on one conversation, seeking to understand, being involved in the lives and problems of others, and bringing the grace and power of Christ to bear in the dark places of our world. Maybe this is why Jesus didn't put credence in public displays and signs and protests. He didn't try to be prominent parts of crowds. Jesus actually tried to avoid crowds. He instead went to those who were alone, those who were suffering, those who were out of the public eye, and made a difference in their lives.

Jesus worked with twelve, not twelve thousand, or twelve million, and just look at the change His life produced.

That's one of the contradictions of the way God's Kingdom works. Most things that we give ourselves to that are so very public don't really wind up meaning that much. Yet those little things we do for the "least of these..." even though we might not see their effect prominently or immediately...those are generally the things that speak of Christ.

So regardless of what you think of our president, let's be found in the crowd that aligns itself with Jesus and that prays for our president and not on him. Let's not jump to conclusions about our brothers' and sisters' motives. We're all growing at the Lord's pace. And, let's be careful to which human persons we give ourselves...our time...our attention...our identity. Let's show the world that our hope...the hope of the world, really...is only found in the Lord.

Home Missions

A story provided by Lexington Rescue Mission:

Last June, Dale moved from Florida to Lexington to live with his brother, Lester. Both of their parents had passed away, and his brother needed him. When they were running low on food last fall, they heard they could find help nearby at Lexington Rescue Mission. They found a meal...and so much more. The Mission was able to help provide them with food and clothing, obtain prescription medicine for Dale, and arrange for an eye exam and get glasses for Lester.

"I just couldn't get over how friendly people are," Dale said. "They would give you the shirt off their back."

As we met their practical needs, it opened the door to minister to their deeper spiritual needs. Both brothers began attending chapel and Bible studies at the Mission and started going to church with our staff every week. This summer, they both committed their lives to the Lord and were baptized.

"I'm a different person now than I was," Lester said. "I'm more of a Christian now."

God has truly transformed their lives, helping the brothers to get off drugs since coming to the Mission. No longer do they smoke marijuana or abuse pills. Instead, they come to the Mission each morning to drink coffee and read the Bible. They volunteer where they can, helping with lunch, cleaning up the lot, or setting up the chapel.

As Dale and Lester surrendered their lives to God, they experienced His faithfulness. With the help of our staff, they were able to move out of homelessness and into their own apartment, and within a week of moving in, the apartment was furnished. It's a life they scarcely could have imagined a year ago.

Without the Mission, Lester said, "I don't think I'd be here today."

Dale added, "We got our lives back."

Let us pray courageous prayers with confident faith!




Prison Ministry


