From the Pastor's Keyboard By Daryl Diddle

If you're like me, you've been somewhat taken by the number of natural disasters that have occurred during these past couple months. Hurricanes, fires, floods, earthquakes...all of them taking enormous human, emotional and financial tolls on our societies.

When big things like these happen—huge things that are utterly beyond our control—we tend to get shaken a bit. That's because we humans don't like to not be in control. In fact, we invest enormous amounts of time, money and energy into gaining and keeping control of our lives, our futures and our environments...and really, we're rather successful at it, in a small, local sense. We keep our cholesterol in check with medicine. Our air conditioners and furnaces keep our homes and cars at temperatures that feel good to us. We manipulate our calendars in order to do what we like. We work hard to keep ourselves comfortable.

We like to be in control...which is exactly why these enormous events shake us up so much: with them comes the shocking reminder that we actually control very little in the grand scheme of our world. One small forest fire...one little earthquake...one hurricane—even a little hurricane (is there such a thing?)—can upend the lives and schedules of a whole society in mere moments. In no time at all, one of these big things can wreck all our little plans...plans that have taken us years to develop.

It's this loss of control that pushes us to consider things we don't normally want to consider. Big disasters...big changes force us to ask big questions about life and death and priorities and values.

You'll notice the news almost never publishes reports on issues like God and faith and Jesus and eternity...except in times of big disasters or war or some other national turmoil. Very few in the public square ever mention the idea of prayer...until we find ourselves out of control of our surroundings.

Big, bad events push us to talk and think about big things.

Maybe that's why God lets these kinds of things happen every once in a while, and more of them (and more frequently) as the time for Jesus' return draws closer and closer.

The amazing fact is, God passionately loves this world He made and He desperately wants to redeem it. He's speaking constantly, yet usually subtly, about the importance of the bigger issues of life, but his image-bearers have tuned Him out. So, unfortunately, in order to be heard, He sometimes has to resort to drastic measures. Like C. S. Lewis said, *"Pain insists upon being attended to. God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pain: it is His megaphone to rouse a deaf world."*

In His grace, God speaks...and even shouts at times...for the sake of our redemption.

Now, at this point in a discussion like this, some will try to shift gears a bit by asking, *"OK, but does God cause or does He allow these kinds of things to happen?"* There probably is a difference, philosophically and theologically, and people have examined that issue for centuries. In truth, however, that's not really the most important question to ask, regarding this topic. Practically speaking...and God is profoundly practical...the most important question is, *"Will we hear and respond to the message that He's trying, through these events, to convey?"*

What makes the difference in our life and eternity is not that we believe God "caused" or "allowed." What makes a difference is whether or not we'll hear and heed His shouts...His message.

And what is the message? The message is that, in spite of how it may seem in a given moment of peace, the fact is, we're simply not in control of our world, and we never were. We're not really in control of our own bodies, in fact, or our health, our families, our environments or, ultimately, our death. We are in control of almost nothing in our lives.

You'll notice the news almost never publishes reports on issues like God and faith and Jesus and eternity...except in times of big disasters or war or some other national turmoil. Very few in the public square ever mention the idea of prayer...until we find ourselves out of control of our surroundings. Big, bad events push us to talk and think about big things.

continued from page 1 Once we truly come face to face with that fact, we either wither with despair or we ask, "Is anyone? Is anyone in control of all this?"

God wants us to know that He is.

God wants us to know that He's there, He's real, He's love and He wants a deep relationship with all of us, His creation. He made us for Himself, and even though we've chosen to go our own way, He wants us back.

He wants us to come to Him, which means, coming to the end of ourselves and this illusion we have of our ability to control.

That's really the message of these storms and floods and earthquakes and fires: God's real, and He wants His creation to realize that and to know Him.

And some do hear God's shouts in life's storms. Some really do come to the end of themselves and admit they need God and His power and His peace in their lives. Some, ironically, find the greatest peace of their lives in the middle of the biggest storms and tragedies they ever face.

Most, though, don't. Unfortunately, once the big things pass out of the reported news, most people slip right back into their isolated, little lives...believing once again that they're in control of their days and forgetting (maybe with some temporary relief) about the larger realities of this world...and the next. Once the shouting is past, most return to their previous state of ignoring God's voice and message, which is such a shame, because life is so much more peace-filled when we keep the larger realities consistently before us.

Those larger realities of life: God, eternity, justice, mercy, forgiveness, sin and it's effects on our world...all of these big things are with us in both good times and hard. It's unfortunate that it takes huge shake ups to force many to consider them.

Whether you believe God causes them or allows them, God fully and mercifully intends to use natural disasters to get our attention...to remind us of our smallness and that He stands ready, able and willing to love and redeem all who will admit their need of Him.

As awful as they are, God uses all these things to remind us of our smallness and so calls people to Himself.

We hear these questions all the time, and they are very good questions! We are always trying to help people belong...in fact, there is a whole team of people dedicated to creating a welcoming atmosphere and to help all, new and old, to know and be known by others and by the church staff and leadership.

Here are some opportunities available to help you "make connections" here.

Welcome Center Our Welcome Center, located in the church foyer, is a great place to gather information about church ministries and services. It is staffed each Sunday morning before and after the services.

Communication Card Please take a moment in the worship services to fill out a Communication Card (the white card in your worship folder) and place it in the offering plate, or turn it in at the Welcome Center. Filling out this card tells the church staff that you want to be known and welcomed to the church. Filling out the card commits you to nothing, except to receive our warm welcome.

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Meet the Pastor After each morning service, Pastor Daryl spends time greeting parishioners at the front doors.

Connections Class This class is held the first Sunday of each month at 9:40 a.m., in room A200, just off the foyer. Members of the Belonging Team, along with the Senior Pastor, lead this time of introduction to the church ministries, staff, theology, and vision. There is plenty of opportunity for your questions as well. Please come!

Membership Class This class is held several times each year, sometimes on Sunday mornings, sometimes on a Saturday morning, and is a great way to explore the church's doctrine and ministries in depth. Attending the class does not commit you to becoming a member.

Adult Bible Fellowships Each Sunday at 9:40 a.m., a variety of ABF's meet together for Bible study and fellowship. Some are small, some are large. Some are discussion-oriented, some use a more traditional teaching format. Some are age-graded while others are inter-generational. These groups allow people to know and be known by others, as well as provide a means of compassionate care in smaller groups.

Church Socials A great way to get to know people is to participate in church socials. Fellowship times with various themes happen monthly. Watch the worship folder each Sunday for details.

Prayer Meeting Each Wednesday night at 7:00 p.m., our church meets to share our joys and struggles and to pray for one another. This time reflects the heartbeat of the church. If you want to truly connect with the life of WFMC, prayer meeting is a must.

Specialty Groups Groups like Women's Bible Studies and Prayer Meetings, Men's Prayer Meeting, Student Prayer Breakfast, Common Threads Prayer Shawl Ministry, and many others provide time for connections and making friendships. A variety of small groups exist. Call the church office, or check the announcements in the worship folder, for current details.

Special Events A variety of ladies', men's, students', and other events fill the church schedule, including retreats, work days, seminars, and many more. Again, check the worship folder for details.

Get-Acquainted Social This is a quarterly social just for the new folk among us. We gather names for invitations from those guests who turn in their Communication Cards. Mention that you'd like to attend on that card, and we'll invite you to the next scheduled social.

Service There are over 100 different areas and places to serve in our church body, and we're always adding more! Not only are all Christians called to serve, but serving alongside other Christians builds community unlike any other experience. Pick up a "Serving Joyfully" brochure at the Welcome Center, fill it out, and drop it in the offering plate. Many opportunities exist for you to use your talents and gifts for the Lord

First-Year Fellowship This is a dinner for people who are in their first year of attending WFMC. Come for the fun, food and fellowship. When you receive your invitation, please RSVP!

Pastoral Care Groups At WFMC, each family is assigned one of the pastors as their Primary Care Pastor (PCP), which allows for the development of a (hopefully) more meaningful pastor/parishioner relationship. Care ministries are, however, primarily conducted via the Adult Bible Fellowships.



From Quincy Burt (Asbury College graduating class of 2006) of Galilean Home Ministries:

Galilean Home Ministries is a non-profit, faith-funded ministry providing children of all ages a place to call home.

There are three avenues of ministry on our campus that come together in what God is doing.

We have 30 special needs residents that call our ministry home, ranging from bed-ridden to compromised abilities in our *Blessing House* and Girls Dorm.

Our *Born Free Ministry* cares for babies of incarcerated mothers. Since 1991 over 700 babies have called our Angel House Home. These little angels go to see their mommies every week for a two-hour bonding visit. The goal is to keep these families together so that, when mommy is released, we reunite baby and mother for their second chance at being a family.

The *Galilean Christian Academy* officially began in 1987 and today is home to nearly 90 students preK-12. GCA utilizes the Alpha/Omega Curriculum and 100% of our students that want to, go to college and do very well. We provide transportation to three surrounding counties at no additional charge to the families. We want to provide a quality, Christian education to any child that wants it, regardless of economic or geographic boundaries.

We also operate, off campus, the *Bread of Life Cafe* in Liberty, KY. Every cent over operating cost comes back to the ministry. The residents that are able work there, while we also provide jobs to the community.

Galilean Home Ministries also operates a thrift store in Liberty called the *Liberty Trading Post* where we sell donated items that aren't able to be utilized on campus. This is a way to provide jobs in the community as well. Again, all profit goes to operations on campus.

Please stop by anytime to see what God is doing on our campus first hand.


