From the Pastor's Keyboard

One of the remarkable abilities God has given us is our memories. To be able to bring things to mind from this enormous data bank we carry in our heads is remarkable.

And memory is so complex! We remember different details about different events or people from different times in our lives to different extents. We can recall every single tiny detail in some cases, while in others, only a vague recollection is possible. We can remember smells, and almost really smell them, and tastes and nearly actually taste them, from decades ago – and yet, often, we can't remember what we had for lunch yesterday.

For some reason, I can remember the taste of my grandmother's chocolate chip cookies and fudge, though I haven't eaten either for decades, but then I totally forgot about going to the Men's Breakfast last month! (Sorry, Mark.)

I so vividly remember the smell of the remains of my uncle's burned barn from my teenage years.

I remember clearly the sound of my grandpa's voice, even though he died when I was in fourth grade.

As I think about people I have met through the years - some faces I remember, but not names, while I remember others' names, but not their faces.

Isn't it all very strange, how memory works?

I also remember precisely the way I felt the first time I experienced God's forgiveness – at a Campus Crusade for Christ (today it's called "CRU") meeting at Kent State University in the fall of 1987. When I entered that meeting, the day had been the typical, ordinary day. But when I left, I was a different person, and I felt lighter and more peaceful than I'd ever felt before in my life.

God has a lot to say in His Word about remembering...primarily that we're to intentionally remember Him and all His characteristics and blessings...in verses like:

Ecclesiastes 12:1 – "Remember also your Creator in the days of your youth, before the evil days come..."

John 14:26 – Jesus said, "But the...Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and bring to your remembrance all that I have said to you."

Psalms 143:5 – "I remember the days of old; I meditate on all that you have done; I ponder the work of your hands."

Revelation 2:5 – "Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent, and do the works you did at first."

I think God calls us to remember Him for several reasons. One is that when our minds are filled with thoughts and memories of Him, those good thoughts tend to crowd out the negative thoughts we're tempted to think.

Also, the more we remember God's power and wisdom and goodness shown to us in days past, the more faith we have in Him for the days to come. Memories of God from the past builds faith for the future.

The last Sunday of October is All Saints Sunday, the day the Church has historically remembered those believers who have passed on to Christ and the blessings of their lives, the practice of which also spurs on our faith.

One person from our church who has, effectively, no earthly family to remember them is Martha Sparks. Martha became part of our church in 2003 and invested her many gifts and talents in the Kingdom through WFMC. We will certainly include her in our remembrance service, since she passed on in August.

In helping to sort through her belongings, we discovered that she had written a prayer every day for five years, from 1965 through 1969. Those prayers have been distilled to 365 (thank you, Bonnie Lashbrook) and will be published in the coming months. For today though, I'd like to include a few of her prayers as a way of remembering, not just Martha, but all those faithful Christ- followers who are waiting for us in Glory. In remembering them, we remember Jesus.

April 17, 1965 – *It is a frightening thing to proclaim one's-self to be a servant of the eternal God. One's shortcomings are then attributed to God himself. Oh God, forgive me for any dishonor that I have brought upon your name. Help me to remember whose I am and who it is that I claim to be.*

October 16, 1966 – *Forgive me for any tendency to sit in judgment of others and help me to remember that judgments are not mine to make. If I see others who seem to worship for selfish reasons, give me sympathy for them and not resentment toward them. Give me a clearer vision that selfishness may be removed from my own life and I be made an inspiration rather than a stumbling block.*

October 24, 1966 – *I begin this day with renewed hope. There is much to be done, but when it is committed to him, it can be done and done triumphantly. I have become faint too often, but there is no need to become faint. Help me to hold fast to what has been revealed, to remember that there is more to come, and to remember that my best efforts will be insufficient if He is left out.*

March 5, 1968 – *No joy can be greater and no honor higher than an awareness of divine law. I am both humbled and exalted as I remember that I am an object of personal concern to the eternal God. No other honor can approach that one in its sublimity or in its challenge. May I accept the challenge with both humility and confidence.*

July 11, 1965 – *It is a joy to receive expressions of thanks and appreciation. But it is a kind of joy that is humbling rather than exalting. I find joy in being an occasional instrument through which good news can be conveyed to others. Lord, help me to be a better instrument and, above all, help me to always remember that I am the conduit, not the originator.*

*“But now, this is what the Lord says—
he who created you, Jacob,
he who formed you, Israel:
“Do not fear, for I have redeemed you;
I have summoned you by name; you are mine.
2 When you pass through the waters,
I will be with you;
and when you pass through the rivers,
they will not sweep over you.
When you walk through the fire,
you will not be burned;
the flames will not set you ablaze.”*

Thank you for praying even when you don't know where I am or what I'm up to!

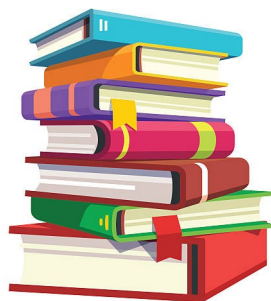

In this children's book, Hermie asks his friends to help rescue another friend, but no one listens. God speaks and Hermie listens and prays.

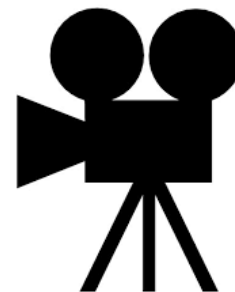
The brightly colored illustrations were done by Daniel Howarth. Pre-school and primary children will like this book.

Boldness in Prayer

The opening chapters of Exodus tell us that Moses owed his physical survival from dangers to his life to six different women. These six include: (1) his mother who placed her newborn in the small basket-ark (the same Hebrew word for Noah's ark); (2) his sister who stood watch; (3) the Egyptian princess who discovered the infant in that ark, and did not turn him over to her Judophobic father; (4 and 5) the two midwives who manipulated the Pharaoh with classic duplicity into believing the Hebrew mothers had birth canals as fast as waterslides at an amusement park; (6) his Midianite wife, Zipporah.

There is one main difference between the first five and the last one. The first five women saved Moses from the wrath of Pharaoh. Zipporah saved Moses (or their son) from the wrath of Yahweh. In perhaps the most enigmatic event in all of Scripture, her act of circumcising Moses (or their son) saved Moses from Yahweh who "was about to / tried to kill him" (Exodus 4:24). What Pharaoh had sought to do to Moses (Exod. 2:15: "When Pharaoh heard of this, he tried to kill Moses...") God will "try" to do to Moses.

It is Zipporah's heroic and mediatorial action that preserves his life. Can we see a connection between this incident and a later one where through intercessory prayer Moses, as mediator, will save his people from the wrath of Yahweh? I am referring to Exodus 32:11-14 and the golden calf incident where it is the bold prayer of Moses, upon hearing of God's intention to destroy both guilty and innocent alike for this egregious idolatry, that Moses asks God to "relent" (KJV: "repent!"), and which God does. Once saved from the wrath of God by another, others are later saved from the wrath of God by Moses.

Here is a great Scriptural warrant for boldness in prayer. My NIV Bible translates Hebrews 4:16 as "Let us then approach the throne of grace with confidence." This is a good translation, but I prefer the KJV which uses "boldness" instead of "confidence." The Greek word is *parrhesia* which my Greek-English lexicon renders as "outspokenness, frankness, fearlessness." When was the last time any of us approached the Lord in prayer in a way that could be described as "frank" or "fearless" or "outspoken"? My own memory is drawing a blank.
