Oh For Grace to Trust Him More

This introduced another layer of concern into my thoughts. (I choose the word, "concern," here since the Bible clearly speaks against "anxiety" and "worry" but not "concern," so that makes it OK. That's a joke, by the way.)

of her family still lives. Most years, our family spends a week or two there in the summer, but this year, for only the second time in 24 years, we chose to go west at Christmas. We were especially looking forward to the trip since we'd not been there at all for almost two years due to Covid.

A couple weeks before we were to leave, however, we started hearing ominous weather reports. Bitter cold (especially for the coast) and snow – lots of it – were forecast for Portland / Longview / Astoria...all to arrive at just about the same time as we were.

Now, after living in Kentucky for nearly 30 years, I've learned not to take weather forecasts all that seriously. No offence to Bill Meck (who I really appreciate, by the way) but the saying here in Kentucky is true, "If you don't care for the weather, stick around. It will quickly change." The only really accurate weather report comes by walking outside and looking around, so I rather dismissed all the hype we were hearing.

Yet as the day to leave drew near, the forecasts actually seemed to get worse...30" of snow at the summit of the route 26 mountain pass...and I was drawn in, checking them regularly as we thought about making our way from the Portland airport over the mountains to the coast. (It really is, "over the river and through the woods to grandmother's house" for us.

On top of the weather issues, the airline flight cancellations due to sick flight crews then began.

We were to fly out of Lexington on the evening of December 26, flying overnight and arriving in Portland early Monday morning. So for several days leading up to that Sunday, I invested a lot of time regularly checking the weather reports, road condition reports and flight monitors, trying to think through alternate plans and answering the questions:

"What if our flight from Lexington is cancelled?"

"What if our connecting flight from Dallas is cancelled?"

"What if we get to Portland and our rental car won't make it through all the snow?"

"What if the mountain pass is closed to traffic?"

"What if tire chains are required to cross the pass?"

"Do rental cars come with chains, and if not, where would we buy them at 2:00 in the morning?"

"What if we get there and then we can't get home due to cancelled flights?"

On and on.

Well, as you know by now, we flew to Portland without incident. All our flights were smooth and on time.

We picked up a rental car and drove it to the coast, over the snowy and icy Route 30 pass - carefully, but without incident. No chains were required.

We flew home without incident, and we had a great time with Annette's family.

The point of my tale here is this: moments invested in worrying, anxiousness or feeling

“concerned” about what the future may or may not bring are moments wasted. The reality is, there are issues in life that we simply can do nothing about, and it’s important to recognize those for what they are and release them to the Lord.

Facing this is difficult for some because it reminds us of how relatively powerless we are, and we don’t like to think of ourselves as powerless. We imagine ourselves to be the exact opposite in fact: powerful and in total control.

But more often than not, that’s just not the case.

I think this is why the Bible speaks so much about trust and faith in God, which is the opposite of worry and anxiety.

To trust is a choice, and when we choose to trust in God, we are not only admitting that we, personally, cannot do much to change the future, but we are also affirming that we know that God can. Choosing to trust reaffirms the right order of power in our lives, our situations and our world.

The Apostle Paul puts it this way in his letter to the Philippians, ***“Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.”***
Philippians 4:6-7

Jesus addresses worry even more forthrightly where He says, ***“Who of you by worrying can add a single hour to your life? Since you cannot do this very little thing, why do you worry about the rest? Consider how the wild flowers grow. They do not labor or spin. Yet I tell you, not even Solomon in all his splendor was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today, and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, how much more will he clothe you—you of little faith! And do not set your heart on what you will eat or drink; do not worry about it. For the pagan world runs after all such things, and your Father knows that you need them. But seek his kingdom, and these things will be given to you as well.”***
Luke 12:25-31

Now, I want to be clear in saying that to be an informed person is just responsible. God calls no one to just wander aimlessly through life.

But insisting upon trying to control what we in fact cannot is illogical and irrational...and it results in needless and fruitless anxiety...as is being displayed in many ways in our world today.

And worry, anxiety and “concern” are detrimental to our well-being in many different ways.

But we can have a calm, peaceful spirit if we’ll recognize that God can control what we cannot...and then trust that He will.

That’s seems like such a simple solution to all the anxiety and worry in our world today...and it truly is. At the same time, it’s a lesson that seems to take most even very faithful Christ-followers a lifetime to learn.

Maybe God is allowing all the upheaval in our world in these days to remind us of the importance of learning to trust Him. Maybe that’s what Jesus’ Church is supposed to be learning through all this. Maybe it’s part of God’s purification process for His bride. Maybe this experience is really more of a blessing than we realize.

Whether or not that’s the case, may we all learn the lesson as we sing the words of Louisa Stead’s old hymn, “Jesus, Jesus, precious Jesus; oh for grace to trust Him more.”

Prayer Lists

The longer I walk with Jesus the more I treasure my prayer lists.

I was not drawn to prayer lists as a young Christian. The only times I saw them used seemed formal. Rather prayer came alive for me as response and relationship — a response to the invitation of my creator to talk with him and a relationship with his son as my Savior. I wouldn't use lists or talking points in day-to-day conversation with a good friend. How could they fit into the most personal relationship of my life?

Over time that gradually changed. Perhaps the Lord changed my perception most effectively by seeing winsome, godly people use prayer lists with power.

When we lived in Indianapolis we attended the West Morris Street Free Methodist Church. Often after worship we would visit briefly with Wesley Duewel. At the time he was in his nineties but still writing and traveling in ministry. We connected partially because he had spent much of his life as a missionary and mission leader and he knew I oversaw our denomination's missions agency. One day he told me that he prayed for me regularly — in fact I was on his everyday prayer list.

I never forgot that conversation. Wesley Duewel had written the books on prayer — Mighty Prevailing Prayer and Touch the World Through Prayer. He prayed for me every day!! What a blessing! You really appreciate being on the everyday prayer list of a prayer warrior, especially when you regularly work on the edges of — or outside — your comfort zone. I became convinced that many miraculous things happened in Free Methodist World Missions because people like Wesley Duewel were praying for us.

The apostle Paul did not hesitate to plead for prayer for himself. He specifically asked for prayer in at least five of his letters. He urged the Romans to pray that he would be rescued from unbelievers and that his ministry would be accepted by believers (15:31). He urged the Ephesians to pray that he would preach fearlessly (6:19-20). He asked the Colossians to pray that God would open a door for the gospel and that he would proclaim it clearly (4:3-4), and he urged the Thessalonians to pray that his message would spread rapidly and that he would be delivered from evil people. (2nd Thess. 3:1-2) In 1st Thessalonians he simply said "Pray for us." (5:25) it was as if he was pleading "Put me on your everyday prayer list."

Here's a thought. Who do you value so highly that you often pray for them? Give them a gift this year. Place them on your **everyday prayer list**. Pray for them earnestly each day. Then give them a gift of encouragement — let them know that you pray for them everyday.

You really appreciate being on the everyday prayer list of a prayer warrior, especially when you regularly work on the edges of — or outside — your comfort zone.

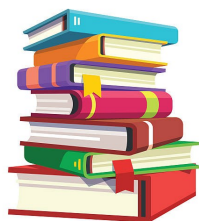

Andrea Tinsley Missionary Update

1) How have you grown spiritually, personally, and relationally in your time in Colombia?

When talking with my mentor a few weeks ago, I admitted that this transition feels a lot like failing every day. I struggle to understand the language and culture. Settling in and finding relationships that are deep is a slow process. Missing the holiday traditions with my family and my church family in the states, having three dental procedures...lots of hard. And yet, I see Jesus calling me closer and deeper with Him. Recognizing that entering into the hard, the suffering of those around me, is the way of Jesus. For that is what He did. He left Heaven and entered our deeply broken and divided world. He walked the road of suffering, his own, and the suffering of those He loved. Failing forward is how this feels. And in this, I see God's transforming work in me, as more of me is stripped away and more of Him is planted deep in my heart, I continue to walk (and sometimes stumble) forward, trusting His guidance and His unfailing love.

2) What is one recent way that you have seen God's hand at work?

In the first few days of this new year, I lost my very dear uncle. It has been very hard being so far from home during this time, however, the Lord has been so faithful to help me grieve and celebrate my uncle's life and impact on my life. And, many friends have reached out to me to offer care and support. Just this past week, as I participated in the Latin America Leaders' Summit, I was reminded of the eternal welcome of the Table of Jesus. We took communion together, and as we did, Jesus reminded me that by coming to His table, I come along with the believers here and around the world, and the believers from generations past who sit at His table daily. What comfort to know that my uncle and my many loved ones who have gone home to Heaven enjoy that table in a deep realness that we cannot fully understand on this side.

3) What is your go-to activity for relaxing in Colombia?

Recently, I have found two cookie recipes that work with very little adjustments to altitude, ingredients, and my oven. One is my aunt's sugar cookies, which I have baked and shared several times in the last few weeks. The other recipe was

peanut butter cookies (which I baked and ate myself J). I am finding joy in baking again!

To rest or relax, I have returned to older movies, and shows that I have enjoyed in the past, no surprises, easy to follow plotlines. I've even watched a few in Spanish, practicing my listening skills.

I also enjoy time with the Gomez family, playing games, enjoying movies together, and sharing meals.

4) What is coming up in February and March?

I have a Spanish intensive starting on February 14th. It is a 4 hour a day program at a local university. I have been studying with a tutor since the second week arriving in Colombia. I hope that the intensive will push me into a new level of understanding and communicating.

My role here in Colombia is in communications, primarily, connecting the stories of God's transformation here in Latin America with the church in the US. I have much to learn as I grow in this role, so I would appreciate your prayers that I can be effective in this role, that I can capture the stories of our brothers and sisters with my limited language skills.



Prison Ministry

Since we have not been able to go to the jail for Bible study, I asked Larry Goldey, the chaplain at Nicholasville jail, what we could do this Christmas for the inmates. He suggested providing envelopes with stamps and paper so the inmates could write letters to their families. A number in the WWT Sunday school class provided money to purchase the stamps.

A family in our neighborhood, the Coyotes, who have visited WFMC, wanted to do something with their children this Christmas. With the donations from the WWT Sunday school class and the Coyotes, we went to the Nicholasville emergency Center prior to Christmas. We were able to serve them pizza, salad, soft drinks and three different types of desserts.

Two of their boys, Robert and Jeremiah, helped tell the Christmas story. We also sang "O Come Let Us Adore Him" and the Coyote boys sang the blessing using the Johnny Appleseed song. Then the family served the food and handed out gift bags with candy and fruit that they had put together. They also handed out socks for each of the people there. The people appreciated the family eating with them and talking with them.

Because of the generous donations from the WWT Sunday school class, my brother, who was in for Christmas from Korea, and I were able to go on Christmas Eve to serve them barbecue sandwiches and baked beans donated by Sonny's as well as desserts we were able to provide.

We appreciate everyone who gave to make this possible. "In as much as you've done it into these, you've done it on to Me."

Dr. Perdue is a tenured evangelist in the Church of the Nazarene having served full-time since 1974. His ministry has taken him to four continents of the world. He is a faithful exponent of the message of scriptural holiness.

Nelson formerly served as the Revivalism Coordinator for the Church of the Nazarene. He is the founder and former executive editor of the periodical, *The Evangelists' Perspective*, and has authored a booklet entitled *Holiness: Our Heritage*. Dr. Perdue's second book, *The School of Christ*, is a compilation of 12 holiness expositions and was published in March 2006. He has also written a study on sanctification entitled *Holiness Horizons: A Purview of Sanctification*. This book was released in April 2007. The most recent book published by Dr. Perdue was written in 2010 and is entitled *The Beauty of Holiness*.

Dr. Perdue was honored with a Doctor of Divinity degree by Mount Vernon Nazarene University in May of 2002, and serves currently as an associate evangelist with the Francis Asbury Society.

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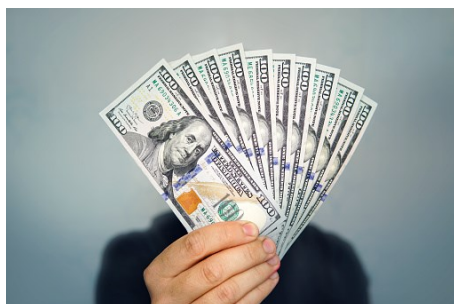
Money and Economics Seminar

(Trying to) Make Sense of our National Economic Situation
