Blessing For A Purpose

I was in the sixth grade when I first entered into fine theatre, taking a role in a play called, "The Capricious Pearls." I'm sure you've seen it, or at least heard of it on Broadway. It was a mystery/detective production, but since I had no idea what the word, "capricious" meant, I really didn't understand

the play. It was actually many years later when I found out that "capricious" means whimsical, changeable, unpredictable, out of the blue, and impulsive.

Do you know someone who is capricious? I confess that, at times in my life, I've thought God was rather capricious, especially in the way He answers prayers, and not just my prayers, but the prayers of my friends and family...and prayers for healing especially.

I've wondered why God seems to quickly answer some prayers for healing, but then doesn't seem to ever answer others. Why does God allow hard or painful things in some peoples' lives, and then seem to protect other people from much of anything that is difficult? Even when Jesus was among us, He healed some people, but as He went to the cross, the earth was filled with other people who still needed healing.

Is that God's capriciousness?

Is God capricious?

Of course, physical healing was not Jesus' central purpose in coming to earth. His purpose in coming was to seek and save the lost. Jesus came to restore our possibility of relationship with God...to redeem the earth and to give humanity the possibility of eternal life with Him. Jesus' central message was a call to repent. Jesus did heal, but the purpose of those healings, though certainly beneficial to those involved, was always to display His power and compassion, to prove His deity...His divine authority, and to reveal God's unlimited ability to free anyone who would repent, from the bondage, the penalty, and the consequences of sin.

In that way, Jesus' healing ministry illustrated His central purpose: to provide redemption and ultimate healing for all who believe. What that means is, both in Jesus' day and in our day, God's healing is not capricious. Whether or not we may see or understand it at the moment, there is always a bigger gospel purpose to all that God does, including God's healing. In those times when we wonder what He's doing or not doing, it's good to remember – God's not capricious. There's always a purpose for what He does, and does not, do. Certainly, we are welcomed...encouraged even...to ask Him to heal. God, Himself, invites us to ask...and in faith. But our faith is not so much that He'll do what we want, but that He'll do what is truly best...that He'll do the thing that will most powerfully advance His greater purpose in our world...bringing redemption and ultimately healing to all who will believe. And we have to trust that God knows what best fulfills that purpose. Like missionary Jim Elliott wrote, "God always gives His best to those who leave the choice with him." God heals for a greater purpose.

Well, just as God heals for a purpose, God also blesses for a purpose. That's the message of Psalm 67: God blesses for a purpose. The psalmist says in verse one: "May God be gracious to us and bless us and make his face shine on us." Why? He gives the reason in verse two: "so that God's ways may be known on earth and God's salvation may be known among all nations."

You see, God has always wanted salvation for people. The Psalmist understood that 1,000 years before Jesus was born. God's goal of redemption for the world didn't start with Jesus; it ended with Him. But even in the Psalmist's day, God had tools to reveal Himself to the unbelieving world, and one of God's tools was to bless those who knew Him, so they could then give Him the glory for His blessing, and in doing that, introduce unbelieving peoples – nations – the Gentiles – to the one true God.

Just as God's healing is never capricious, neither are God's blessings. They're not just based on His own thoughtless whim or random luck. God doesn't bless some because He likes them better, or because they've done nice things for Him, or because they've prayed in a certain way...you know, using certain words. God's blessings are not His random value judgements. God blesses people so that somehow... and we may not see exactly how...His greater purpose of redemption is pushed forward. And the Psalmist lines out God's greater purpose as the Psalm unfolds.

Verse one: "May God be gracious to us and bless us and make his face shine on us...so that..."

Verse two: "God's ways may be known on earth and God's salvation may be known among all nations."

Verse three: "So that all the peoples will praise God." Verse four: "So the nations can be glad and sing for joy."

Verse seven: "So that all the end of the earth will fear him."

You see, the Psalmist isn't really praying for God's blessing upon him and his people for their own sake. He's saying, "May God bless us so His greater purposes would be fulfilled." So the world will come to know who God is. Actually, that sort of prayer essentially takes ourselves out of the equation, doesn't it?

That's the sort of prayer that wants God's will and purposes more than anything else...more than even our own healing or blessing...and that trusts God to work out the details. I think that's what Jim Elliott was talking about in saying, "God always gives His best to those who leave the choice with him." So...do we ask God for things? Absolutely! He wants us...He asks us to ask Him. But is His purpose...is His best the true motivation for our asking? And in His answer, will we trust Him...are we content to believe that He'll give us His best if we leave the choice with Him?

met some of the best friends a person could ask for and became the "different one" because of my Southern accent!"

Since moving to Kentucky, Donna has again become involved in showing horses, plus working with a dog fostering program called "Paws4TheCause". She has discovered pickleball and is also a member of the "Common Threads" group at WFMC.

Don's form of "horsepower" involves gasoline, tires and periodic trips to the Bowling Green Corvette Museum (Don and Donna own the gold Corvette with the license plate that reads, "OH WOW" which you may have seen in the WFMC parking lot from time to time.)





Walk With The Holy Spirit

A Transparent Walk With the Holy Spirit

However long we have walked with the Lord in our spiritual journey, it seems that there is always more to be learned: the Lord is always taking us "further in and deeper down" in developing our spiritual character. In my own experience, the Lord has been working with me in recent years to be more sensitive to the Holy Spirit's directions and fully transparent in my relationship with Him. A summary would be "a transparent walk with the Holy Spirit."

First, consider what it means to "walk with God." According to Google, "In a biblical sense, 'walking with God' means living a life that is pleasing to Him, characterized by obedience, faith, and a close relationship with Him. It involves seeking His guidance, acknowledging His presence, and living in accordance with His will in all aspects of life." Further, Dr. Kinlaw states, "the biblical term for the Christian life is 'walk.'" (This Day With The Master (TDWTM), by Dennis Kinlaw, June 11)

Then take this thought one step further by considering what it means to be a transparent person. Again, according to Google, "A transparent person is open, honest, and forthright in their actions and communication. They willingly share their thoughts, feelings, and motivations, without hiding any information or trying to deceive others. Essentially, what you see is what you get – they are authentic and genuine." So let me make application of the concept of a transparent walk in my own experience. In recent decades, I have reflected on spiritual growth – or the lack there of – in myself and other persons. One aspect that I came to see is that of "blind spots" in my own spiritual life. The prophet Jeremiah tells us that "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked; who can know it?" (Jeremiah 17:9) So as I reflected on this matter, I came to understand that even a saved and sanctified heart may still need a fuller and deeper cleansing by having areas brought to light by the illumination of the Holy Spirit. Subsequently, as I reflected on the application of these concepts in my own life, I concluded that it is not sufficient just to "be obedient to the Holy Spirit," as worthy as that is. I need to intentionally ask the Holy Spirit to search my life, experiences, actions, and thoughts and reveal anything that is not pleasing to Him and needs attention. I find myself praying with David in Psalm 139:23-24 "Search me, O God, and know my heart; try me, and know my anxieties; and see if there is any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting."

In my experience with this endeavor, I have found that I needed to reconsider how I understand and act on thoughts or impressions about something in my life or some past action. In the more distant past, I would often just reflect on such impressions or thoughts without drawing much conclusion, considering that, since my past is under the Blood of Christ, it is past and does not need further consideration. But in more recent times, as I have endeavored to be fully transparent with the Holy Spirit, I have learned to pay more attention to such thoughts and impressions. Most of the time, these thoughts and impressions come to my mind "out of the blue;" that is, not related to any other present thought. Sometimes I find myself fully awake in the early hours of the morning with a thought clearly in my mind. So, now I consider such thoughts and impressions with the analysis, "is there any reason that I should not follow up and act on this thought, rather than just dismiss it as an overactive mind?" Summarily, my present position is, since I have asked the Holy Spirit to bring to my attention anything about my life that I have overlooked or failed to address, then I should immediately follow up on the impression or thought.

Let me share a recent example. One night I awakened with the memory of an experience in my early teen years, before I was saved. On one occasion in the fall of the year around the time of the first frost, I was at a nearby friend's home. Adjacent to his home was a field of green bell peppers. Since the weather

had frosted, my friend said, "they can't sell these peppers since they have been frosted. They will all go to waste." Therefore, without asking for permission, I took an armful of the peppers home — and thought no more about it — until the Holy Spirit recently brought the incident to mind. So then as I considered the matter, I concluded that I need to make restitution for my theft so long ago. But I do not know the owner and likely they are no longer living. So that is where my pastor comes into play. I confessed the incident to Pastor Diddle and gave him an appropriate sum of money to more than pay for the peppers. By addressing this incident, I continue to walk transparently with the Holy Spirit.

In closing, I share two insightful statements by Dennis Kinlaw about walking with the Holy Spirit: "In a sense, it is easier to be filled with the Holy Spirit than it is to walk in the Holy Spirit." Joyfully Prepared

"Can we actually know heaven is for real? Can we, with intellectual integrity, affirm a future place we have not been to and only have read or heard secondhand accounts?" I get questions like these on occasion and have had my own wonders. What is astounding to me, 20 years out as a hospice chaplain, is how strong my knowing has become. In reflection, I am quite aware how "stuck" my knowing was in cognitive, cerebral, and theological knowledge 25 years ago. But it is very different now – what has changed?

First, the unexpected cancer diagnosis of my otherwise healthy 46-year-old sister in 1998. She was quite the athlete in good physical condition. For her to call us the day of her 47th birthday and tell us her doctor said she had aggressive cancer, with no biopsies, was shocking. Here my collision with head and heart began. Kathie Lynn was diagnosed with an unknown primary cancer (about 6-10 percent of all cancers) that grew at a stunning rate. She had been playing soccer, golf and running a month previous making this all the more difficult to comprehend. She also was experiencing a spiritual transformation that was equally stunning thanks to some Dominican sisters on Long Island and her experience and encounter of the living Christ.

To this day, I still process the wonders and mysteries of a blunt 40-day journey from diagnosis to death. There was so much grace and heart ache. So many "angels" of compassion. So much of not knowing what to do next. Her nurse and Dominican friends showed us the way to guide Kathie, my sister Nancy and myself. She laid down her life with grace and courage and breath-taking peace. She died in late September and my broken heart was in awe. Six months later, as we celebrated Easter, I could not stop crying tears of joy. I knew that I knew that I knew she was alive in the presence of a living Savior. My belief started the journey from head to heart.

To this account I can add hundreds more. Patients and/or family members who have had a personal encounter with Christ in near-death situations and the absence of fear as they embraced the reality of their deaths. The many accounts of family members, and myself, hearing patients talking to deceased loved ones as if they were in the room moments before death and their faces aglow with seeing something we were not.

Of course, all of this is an affirmation of Scripture! He has prepared a place for us, a house not built by human hands. A place that no eye has seen, no ear has heard or mind could ever imagine. That's a scripture worthy of our frequent meditation. We ARE surrounded by a great cloud of witnesses and, sometimes, the veil between the two worlds is translucent...and holy, sacred ground.

Our church is a remarkable group, made up of people with all sorts of talents and skills. Several among us are authors, and here are just a few recent works WFMC writers have published.


Meta Story: What Marvel & the Messiah Can Teach Us About Great Storytelling, by Sean Gaffney


Consider the Lilies: How Jesus Saves People and the Land, by Howard Snyder

The Good Side of "Legalism"

Reducing Uncertainty

"For where a will is involved, the death of the one who made it must be established. For a will takes effect only at death, since it is not in force as long as the one who made it is alive." ~ Hebrews 9:16-17

This concept was written in the book of Hebrews many years ago and is still applicable now. When you write a will, it does not go into force until you die. You can change your will and add instructions or take them away throughout your life but once you die, then your instructions are set. If you choose not to create a will, then the assets and debts that you leave behind are going to be dealt with in accordance with state law. However, with no instructions left by you, there may be confusion and strife within the family as they deal with the grief of losing you and also being disorganized and working without any clear instructions. Do not fear putting your current wishes down on paper in a legal manner. As life changes, your wishes may change and, in most cases, you can change estate planning. Not planning at all leave a huge mess for your loved ones to untangle later.

Kentucky law states that if a person does not have a will then the estate will be divided in the manner set out by statute. A simplified reading of the statutes has the estate divided with one half going to the surviving spouse and the other half being divided between the children. However, it is usually more complex than that depending upon multiple variables. Other states may give everything to the surviving spouse, but not Kentucky. I have seen the lack of a will cause a lot of headaches for the surviving spouse, especially when the children are not focused on ensuring the needs of the surviving spouse are taken care of first.

There are many ways in which to organize your assets to make giving gifts to your family and friends as smooth as possible. You may have it covered in your Last Will and Testament, you can have your bank accounts set as "Pay on Death" or "Transfer on Death", you can have a contractual agreement with your investment company or insurance company to give the funds to your beneficiary directly, or you can own assets jointly with right of survivorship. Trusts are also an option, but make sure you understand the nature of the trust and how it works. Do you know how your assets are titled and how they will be managed and divided after you no longer need them on this earth?

In Kentucky, a document written wholly in your handwriting, signed and dated by you stating what you want to happen after your death can be enforced by the court. But just like a typed, signed, witnessed and notarized will, it does not actually have any authority until the district judge approves it and appoints someone to follow the instructions. This process is called probate. Your estate, whether with a will (testate) or without a will (intestate) will have to go through the court probate process unless you take measures to avoid it. That takes planning and action on your part to make it happen. It has been my experience that worries lessen and stress is reduced once you get things organized and settled, and if we are less stressed, we sleep better and live longer, which means the document will not go into effect for many years.

Kenya & Rwanda Report

"I'm going home tomorrow morning." "I haven't been home in three years. I'm going home tomorrow to reconcile with my daughter, my mother, my family." I tried to absorb the significance of these statements and promises that were made by two changed women in front of over 400 people on the streets of a small town in Kenya. These are just two examples of times my heart was touched and moved by the work of God during my three-weeks in Kenya and Rwanda. My heart continues to cry out for these and so many others who are lost and broken, enticed away from their families and a faithful God. We went, we shared, and many responded. I continue to pray that these two prodigals will find welcome and restoration in their family homes and in their relationship with God, their Loving and Forgiving Father.

I joined forces with more than 300 Africa Gospel Church (AGC) Evangelists from across Kenya for a one-week conference in Tenwek, preaching daily to this receptive group of 300 dedicated men and women. We worshipped, prayed, shared new methods of evangelism, spoke together of the realities of ministry in the digital age, and brought forth practical ideas about how an Evangelist can feed his/her family while doing itinerate work. One evangelist testified that she prayed about whether to pay her rent or pay the \$20 conference fee. With tears she gave thanks to God for encouraging her to attend the conference leaving her rent to be paid by faith. She had just received notice that her rent was paid in full. Praise the Lord!

This faithful group of called ones then took it all to the streets over two afternoons of outdoor meetings in two different neighborhoods of Silibwet, a town outside of Tenwek. We saw over 100 people give their lives to Jesus. In the part of town of Silibwet where the selling of alcohol, drugs, and sex traffic flows, we Evangelists set up our speakers, mics, drums, keyboard, and guitars to "blast" the community with the Gospel. Timothy and I went out to invite people to the afternoon street meeting and walked over to where two young women slept right on the grass. We tried to wake them up but they wouldn't budge. "I believe they are demon possessed," Timothy told me. "And look. They're both pregnant." We encouraged them to wake up, and began to pray that they would want to turn from darkness to light. More Evangelists gathered to pray for them and call out the darkness – the demons – to leave them. In the end they awoke to the good news of freedom and knelt in the street to accept Jesus as their Savior. On Good Friday evening, I was asked by the AGC Director of Evangelists, Rev. Hillary Korir, to keep the worship and preaching service to one hour - from 7:30 to 8:30. He wanted to show the Jesus film afterwards. I finished preaching at 8:30 but the responses following the message lasted until they shut down the meeting at midnight. A wonderful season of prayer and confession broke out and there was such joy and freedom in the room! "I will never be the same," one shared publicly. "I was filled with the Holy Spirt!" another shared. The conference organizing team reported, "The Holy Spirit powerfully moved among us uniting, healing, and empowering us."

I had the opportunity to spend a long weekend in the village of Shanjetso, Kenya, where two years ago we took a WFMC team of 12 to support this local Free Methodist Church. More than 100 filled the church for the one-day holiness conference on Saturday and over 200 filled the church for worship on Sunday. A few years ago, Pastor Angeline and Hicks Savala called this a "church of two" which slowly grew to a "church of 12."Now, this church is weekly growing and has reached attendance beyond its physical capacities! We thank God for the vibrant spiritual life in this church! Rev. Hillary (AGC) and I flew on to Rwanda to teach in two Free Methodist conferences for Pastors and Evangelists in Kigali and Kibogora. I taught on "How to Preach and Teach" and Rev. Hillary taught on "Strategies for Evangelism." I continue to carry a burden for the church in Rwanda since the 1994 genocide which decimated most of the leaders of the church. The need is acute for discipleship, mentoring, and rebuilding of young leaders. "We now feel the gap," reported one of the organizers following our teaching. They feel hungry for more teaching and training. The move of the Holy Spirit was not as intense as we experienced in Kenya, but new ideas and hope and tools and energy emerged for these 160 Pastors and Evangelists.
