Everyday Riches

correspondent from an evangelical Catholic organization called One Thousand Reasons to Believe. She contacted our church in early September and asked for help in identifying people she could interview about the Asbury outpouring earlier this year.

I told her she would be more pleased with interviews with university personnel and gave her a number of contacts there. Still, she wanted to meet and talk with me, and I'm glad we were able to do so because our conversation was a blessing. Let me tell you why.

Although the Lord is moving and working in France, as He is everywhere, the truth is, most of Western Europe – and the global west for that matter, is spiritually dry; definitely a post-Christian, or anti-Christian culture. For decades, Christian missionaries have considered France one of the hardest, most impregnable mission fields in the world, which is a tragedy, since Europe was once such a strong, vibrant place of faith in Jesus.

Europe's empty cathedrals tell the story.

As we spoke in my office, Marie noted how impressed she was with our church building and the facility as I described the different things that go on in the rooms. She said she'd not seen this in France and was amazed so many work hard together in worship, in education, in maturing in Christ, and in trying to make Jesus known to others. She continued to remark how "this is just not the way the church in France operates."

Marie felt there was something special here...in our church and community, remarking how, even on her walk to the church from the Asbury Inn, she could sense a calm and peace that she rarely felt...as if the Lord was here with her.

I suggested that she move here, since she would find the taxation rates cheaper too. :-)

Actually, Marie is not the first person from Europe to react this way.

Toward the end of the outpouring, a mom and her adult niece from Germany, at the advice of some friends of ours, were encouraged to worship with us on that Sunday. They were so impressed at what they experienced in Wilmore, and especially in morning worship, that they returned that evening for the Healing Service – and came to be prayed over – that they may be an even stronger light to their many friends back home who have no interest in Jesus.

My point? Simply this: we take for granted the spiritual vitality of where we live and worship. So much of the world – of our country – would love to live in a place where many of their neighbors are Christians, where their children can have Christian friends and play in safe neighborhoods, and where they can worship and serve in any one of many, close-by, Bible-believing, Christ-centered churches.

Of course our church and community have their weaknesses and needs...many of them.

But we are spiritually rich here...so, so rich...compared to most of our world.

I've been reminded of this several times this year – first in my visit to Africa this past spring, and again when someone visits, looks around with amazement and comments on how spiritually rich we are.

History shows us how easy it is for “rich” people to become lazy, complacent and presumptuous.

Generally speaking, “rich” people find it very easy to complain when they don't get their way.

“Rich” people don't like it when their expectations are not met.

“Rich” people tend to not be very patient or gracious, and can easily come to believe that the world owes them even more than they have.

Maybe that's why Jesus, though He loves all people, tended to favor the poor, not only since He

knew what it was like to be poor, but because the true poor see and appreciate the wealth that they have.

In this season, as we think of Jesus who, for our sakes, became poor so that we could be rich, let's pray that we'll always see and appreciate our spiritual riches, never taking God's blessing for granted, removing the critical or complacent spirit, and being faithful as He calls us to share our riches.

A Simple Prayer

About 16 years ago, after the birth of my daughter, I remember praying the prayer, “Lord, help me know you and love you more.” As a new parent, I felt completely inadequate to teach and lead my daughter into a loving relationship with God. Even though I had been a life-long church attender and had made a commitment to Christ in my teenage years, my understanding of God was built upon a ‘saved and behaved’ faith and I hoped that it would be enough. Obviously, I limped along in my Christian walk.

I knew there was more to it. I've heard so many testimonies of men and women deeply in love and committed to God, no matter their personal circumstances or what was happening in the world around them. I yearned for that type of relationship, for my sake and that of my family.

I can report that God heard my prayer and continues to teach me about Himself in new and exciting ways. He did not zap me with instant love the moment I prayed that prayer. In fact, I didn't feel any different for a long time. But as I look back,

seeing His gentle guidance these last 16 years, I'm overwhelmed with feelings of gratitude. He is faithful in helping me know and love Him more. I'm excited to tell you what He has been teaching me lately.

Jennifer Fairbairn recommended that I and others in a small group read the book, *Delighting in the Trinity* by Michael Reeves. Honestly, I wasn't overly interested or curious about the Trinity. I could tell you about the Trinity in very general terms (probably using the 3 leaf clover illustration that I learned from a Veggie Tales video about Saint Patrick). I had heard many sermons about the Trinity by wonderful preachers and teachers, and I could recite the Apostle's Creed, so really, wasn't that enough? Oh thank you, Jesus! He has shown us it is so much better than we could have imagined!

If I could draw a picture of my early Christian walk, it would be filled with sharp, stark lines colored in various shades of gray. God keeps transforming the picture. As I learn new things, new colors and shapes, muted at first, keep gradually emerging. I'm

always so grateful for each new enhancement. But now, I'm starting to really see the Painter for who He is. God, who is Father, overflows with love for His Son, expressed through the Spirit; and the Son returning that love, through the Spirit, back to the Father. This love-filled relationship has spilled over and is the reason that God created us, so that we can join in and be a part of this relationship.

In *Delighting in the Trinity*, Michael Reeves quotes Jonathan Edwards by saying, "This God's very self is found in giving, not taking. This God is like a fountain of goodness, and so, he (Jonathan Edwards) said, 'seeking himself' means seeking 'himself diffused and expressed', - in other words, seeking to have himself, his life and his goodness shared. His very nature is about going out and sharing of his own fullness, and so that is what he is all about." And because in His very nature He is this overflowing fountain of fervent love, Jesus came to rescue us from ourselves and our complete

separation from God. He shows us who the Father is and when we turn to Jesus for salvation, He joins with us, lifting us back into relationship with the Father, and sends the Spirit to continue pouring His overabundant, life-giving love into our lives. This God, our Painter, who is three Persons and yet One, is pulsing with love, beauty, joy, light and life. He wants us, more than anything, to join with Him so we can have "life and have it to the full." (John 10:10) Not a perfect life, but a life of learning and experiencing perfect love so that we can reflect that love back to God and to those around us.

So please, join with me in praying to know and love God more. And if understanding God as Trinity is not something you have spent much time thinking about, I challenge you to start there. You will find that He is so faithful, answering your prayers and giving new life. His love will overflow within you so you, in turn, can love your family, neighbors, and world as He first loved us.

“Getting to Know You” John and Nancy Coffee

John and Nancy Coffee moved to Kentucky from New Jersey so that they could be closer to their daughter, Caitlin Gothay (WFMC’s youth pastor), her husband Christian, and their four children, Ashante, Van, Maxwell and Conrad.

John and Nancy were both born in Philadelphia, PA. Nancy grew up in Croydon, PA. She had a twin brother who died at the age of 47, but knowing that she will see him again has been her comfort. She also has a younger sister and brother with whom she is very close.

John grew up in various towns and cities in New Jersey as his father was an ordained elder in the United Methodist Church. John accepted Jesus as his Savior as a teenager at summer camp in Malaga, NJ. Not long afterward, he was involved in a very serious car accident. He was taken to the hospital D.O.A., but 20 minutes later a Jewish doctor was passing by the hospital on his Sabbath, and something (or Someone) told him to stop. He went into the E.R. and discovered that John was alive! Emergency surgeries were performed and after many days in a coma, John awoke while his church was conducting a prayer service for him. He went on to graduate from high school and attend Asbury College with a pre-Med/Biology degree in hopes of becoming a medical doctor. However, after attending two years of medical school in Philadelphia, he decided to return to Asbury Seminary to complete his master’s degree. He returned to New Jersey and was ordained as an elder in the United Methodist Church. He served in various churches and then retired in 2012 from working at a state psychiatric hospital.



Nancy’s faith journey was formed in her youth while growing up in the United Methodist Church. She accepted Jesus as her Savior at a young age, but in her early 20’s she found that relationship slipping. In her late 20’s, she had a spiritual

awakening and she hungered for the Bible. She has been moving forward ever since, teaching Sunday School, being involved in VBS, serving as a Sunday school superintendent, and serving on various church committees – all growing experiences in the Lord.

John and Nancy had both been married previously and had children from those marriages when they met through an online dating site in 1992. This year, they celebrated 31 years of marriage. Caitlin was their “late-in-life” blessing. All of their previous children were very happy to have another sister. They all agree that Caitlin has brought much joy to the entire family.

Nancy retired from teaching special-needs students in 2015, and now helps with the homeschool co-op at WFMC, assisting Jenny Madill.

John and Nancy are very happy to be here! Please make them feel welcomed.

Youth Ministries

There are many different youth events at WPMC each week. On Tuesday mornings there is the Youth Prayer Breakfast, Wednesdays hold Youth Group, and Sundays contain church, Sunday School, and afterglow. Let me walk you through a regular week of youth activities .

We start with Tuesday morning Prayer Breakfast. The youth show up and slowly break into small groups. In my small group, we take praises and prayer requests before praying for certain people each week. Then we each pray about specific things in our friends' lives. We then gather in the hospitality room and have a short devotional time before we eat breakfast and fellowship with each other. About 8:20am, we load up in the church vans and are dropped off at school.

On Wednesdays during Youth Group, we have been learning about spiritual disciplines. Each week we will have a different discipline. So far, we have gone through meditation, prayer, fasting, simplicity, and worship. After Caitlin talks to the youth as a whole, we are released into our small groups (of 5 to 7) where we talk on a deeper level about using this discipline in our own lives. In my small group, we are usually given a challenge to complete related to that discipline. For example, after the talk about meditation, my small group leader gave everyone a sheet of paper which had Bible verses about meditation. We were supposed to look these up and find a time to meditate each day. This past week, we were given a 30-day challenge of being

thankful to God for his many different attributes. These challenges are pushing me toward a deeper relationship with my Best Friend and I am so thankful.

On Sundays, there is church, Sunday school, and afterglow. I signed up to help the 4 and 5 year old Sunday school, so I am unsure what is being taught at the moment in the high school Sunday school. After evening service, the youth are taken to the host's house or to the gym for a time of fellowship and food. At about 8:30 we are taken back to the church where parents pick us up.

After Sunday, we start the week over and do it all again. I have thoroughly enjoyed being a part of the youth group and am excited to learn even more and grow in my relationship with the Lord.

This past weekend (October 27-29), we went on fall retreat. These retreats only happen twice a year, but are very special times. About 60 of the youth went to fall retreat this year at Eagle Ridge in Bowling Green, KY. I have been going to Eagle Ridge since I was in 4th grade, and I love it. It is a special place where many have the opportunity to get away from the stress of life and reconnect with their friends and God on a deeper level. At fall retreat this year, we heard from some of our youth leaders who shared their testimonies. It was very impactful to hear how the Lord is working in our midst even now!

Asia Ministry Update

Jerry and Jan Coleman recently had the privilege of serving Christ in various cities across Asia. The names of these cities have been purposefully omitted.

The primary focus in the first city was a four-day event to celebrate 45 years of Free Methodist ministry. More than 2500 people were in attendance. Most of the attendees travelled many hours (and even days) on trains and buses from remote villages. In addition, local dignitaries and politicians from the area who are sympathetic to the work were invited. A Free Methodist bishop and his wife followed the Holy Spirit's leading to reach the unreached with the Gospel. Now they oversee 400 Free Methodist congregations with over 50,000 people, plus many orphanages, primary and secondary schools, and colleges. The Holy Spirit helped Jan as she addressed 400 women and me as I twice addressed the large gathering.

Our primary focus in the second city was an event with Nazarene pastors and district leaders. We were invited to speak in this two-day conference which focused on unity of purpose and mission. Jan addressed the group on the topic of prayer. After my message on forgiveness and reconciliation we witnessed a spiritual breakthrough with leaders weeping and reconciling with one another! The conference leader who invited us had shared that there was long-standing division and conflict between a number of pastors which was really harming the ministry. She was thrilled with the evidence and testimony that unity was happening before our eyes. Praise the Lord! The testimonies around the evening campfire went on extensively.

The second contact in this city was with an independent Pentecostal church. I spoke at their prayer meeting one day and the next day at a meeting with 30 pastors who live on the most basic of resources. As the pastors introduced themselves and their ministries we learned of the sacrifices and hardships they endure to follow their call. A number of them have been severely persecuted and even physically beaten for proclaiming the Gospel. We were shown a paper file on the statistics and learned that many of these pastors and their families live on practically nothing (one pastor reported a monthly income of \$13). At the conclusion of the meeting the pastors received an envelope with \$3 for transportation costs. They also received a sack lunch. We were awed and humbled by these saints!

We spent one day at a nearby seminary with the director. The seminary has an official affiliation with our local seminary. Jan spoke to 20 student wives. I taught a cross-cultural communication class and a report on the recent Outpouring with some teaching on awakening in the chapel prayer service.

In the third city I preached in a local Free Methodist Church Sunday morning. Jan spoke to 50 women from the district conference. She had time with the wife of the bishop, and also did home visitation with ladies from the church. My last event was addressing Free Methodist pastors of the district conference. I shared accounts from the recent Outpouring along with Scripture challenging us to prepare for awakening. The meeting was both live and online.

Throughout our time, we had many opportunities to meet with people individually for sharing and counseling. We prayed with many

Before we left, we were able to give them stamped envelopes to write to their families as well as pages from a large print Daily Bread given to us by Robbie Joy. We also provided some physical food in the form of chocolates. They were very appreciative of these small kindnesses.


