"How many times have I told you to make sure the back door latches when you go outside? If you don't, the wind blows it open, and all the heat just goes outside."

"Please hang your Sunday clothes up when you get home."

"Don't forget to brush your teeth!"

"I asked you to clear the table...why are there still dirty dishes on it?"

"When you come in, don't just toss your jacket on the chair. Hang it up."

"Bring your school stuff in from the car...don't leave it there."

"Please don't leave your books and toys lying all around the house. Put them back where they belong."

"Now, I know you know how to fold clothes better than that. Do a **good** job."

"You have to wear your retainer every day."

"Who spilled this and didn't clean it up?"

"I shouldn't have to tell you every time to hang up your towel after your shower."

"Did you use deodorant? You have to use deodorant **every time**."

"Before you come in from outside, make sure you put all your toys away."

With Annette gone for eleven days this past month and me playing Mr. Mom (and Dad), I found that the frequency of my use of certain words and phrases, like those above, skyrocketed. "Please remember to...why didn't you...haven't I told you a dozen times before to..." rolled from my lips over and over again and, not always, I'm sorry to say, with a tremendous amount of grace.

Well, as I drove to the airport to pick up Annette the other night, my mind began thinking back to the boys and our time together and my repetition of these phrases to them, and the thought struck me that, so often, God must feel about me the same way I've felt about our boys. So often, my own Heavenly Father must wonder, "Why do I have to tell that kid so many times to do this or that before he finally gets it?"

My thankfulness for the patience of God with me should, and prayerfully will, make me a more patient father myself. That is, really, the only reasonable response to God's grace shown to us, isn't it?

"In the meantime, Lord, keep after me. Please do keep telling me, over and over again. Believe it or not, I really do want to do what's right. I admit, my hearing and remembering are both a little damaged. Because of the fall, I'm not naturally wired to obey, but I really do want to. I really do want to get it right."

Even as I pray that, Lord, help me remember that the same is true with my boys.

CONSTRUCTION PLANNING TEAM UPDATE

Excitement abounds as we are now able to see the steel structure of the discipleship building. Despite losing many work days due to the wet weather conditions, much has been accomplished since the last *Plumblin*e edition. The following are the most recent updates to our building project:

- ◆ The water detention area is completed and has rolls of grass seed applied.
- ◆ The new sewage pump station has been officially approved and placed in operation. The old pump station has been removed!
- ◆ Cement trucks were finally able to reach the building site, and the ground level floor has been poured.
- ◆ The sanctuary and CMC buildings have been reroofed. All three buildings will have matching shingles.
- ◆ The metal decking for the roof of the new building should be completed by the first of December. The shingle decking should be installed by mid December. This will allow the workers to begin to enclose the structure before harsh weather arrives.
- ◆ We have encountered “bad soils” again; this time under the corridor that will connect the new building to the CMC. This has resulted in more delays until the cost issue can be resolved.



It will also mean a *change order for construction* that will be necessary, which ultimately results in additional expense. We are trusting additional contributions will cover this unforeseen soil problem.



The Construction Planning Team and the Closing the Gap Team wish to express deep gratitude and sincere appreciation to the Zweifel family for designating our building project in lieu of flowers for Cecil’s funeral. Cecil often expressed his gratitude for the time and effort put forth by the Construction Planning Team. He always supported the building project and was a great source of encouragement to me. His memory will always be with us.

WASTE OR FERTILIZER?

Jesus told a parable of a man who had a fig tree:

“For three years now I’ve been coming to look for fruit on this fig tree and haven’t found any. Cut it down! Why should it use up the soil?”

‘Sir’, the [gardener] replied, ‘leave it alone for one more year, and I’ll dig around it and fertilize it. If it bears fruit next year, fine! If not, then cut it down!’ (Luke 13:7-9).

“Cut it down!” is the quickest human solution to whatever stands in our way. Get rid of it. Clear the way for bigger and better, more profitable plans. Throw it away if it isn’t working the way we want it to work. In our highly disposable society, this attitude seeps into our relationships as well. If marriage isn’t working for *me*, we think we might as well give up and throw it away. Divorce and start over.

But people are not disposable. While marriage is temporal, people are eternal. I am learning through our study of Gary Thomas’s *Sacred Marriage* book and video series that the purpose of marriage is meant for more than bringing me happiness and fulfillment. This close, intense relationship may well be designed by God as the tool to shape two sinners into saints. It is a major change in perspective to go from looking to marriage to meet my needs, to seeing it as an avenue through which God wants to shape me.

Perhaps we are not as frustrated with our spouse as we are with being confronted by our own self-centeredness and wanting our own way. It is in the daily friction of marriage that we learn how to love our neighbor as ourselves, resembling God’s unending love. Marriage grants us practice in asking for forgiveness repeatedly and saying, “Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing.”

While we may be looking for fruit to enjoy, just wait—those frustrating irritations, the things we consider as waste, may be the very fertilizer God is using to produce a godly person out of you and me.


Attack At Shark Bay

Attack At Shark Bay is a book about four good friends living in New Zealand. The four friends—Jackson (14); his sister, Jessica (10); their friend, Rangi (14); and his sister, Sam (14) — call themselves the Riwaka Gang. At the beginning of the book, the reader finds that Mr. Chapman, a teacher who is greatly admired by the Riwaka Gang, goes missing. After failed attempts by the police to find Chappy (the name the kids call Mr. Chapman), the Riwaka Gang decides to get involved. When clues like an iPod and two confessing bullies make them worry all the more, the Riwaka Gang goes through more than they would have expected, whether it be tension between siblings or getting shot. The characters are constantly overcoming challenges as the thrilling adventure unfolds in an easy-to-read way.

Throughout the book, the characters ask God for help in their times of need, such as when they find that they need to feel secure. The reliance and faith that the characters have in God is a great example to me, personally, that no matter what fear may be inside me or what conflicts I may be dealing with, I can always ask God for help and for strength. He walks with me through everything, and God is with everyone all the time. There are tragedies in life and times that we think are hard to get through but, with God's help and his abundant provision of grace, we can overcome all the challenges that we face in this world.

MUCH PRAYER, MUCH CONFIDENCE

Last summer, 2013, we returned to Central Asia from our homeland assignment in Kentucky. We were immediately reminded of a comment our children had made at the beginning of our time in Wilmore, "We want to go back to Central Asia. The roads in Kentucky are too smooth." The humor of that comment wore off quickly when reality hit me. Our dusty, bumpy dirt road was the source of many flat tires, increased car maintenance, and coughing spells, since many cars passing by left clouds of dust in our front yard. I was desperate about having a paved road.

I started praying seriously that our street would be paved. We had been living in that neighborhood for over eight years and I prayed for a nice, paved road from time to time. This time I prayed seriously for over a year.

Two weeks ago, the city spread a smooth layer of asphalt right in front of our gate. Once, there were so many potholes, stones, and uneven places; now our only concern is about speeding cars.

God is faithful and rewarding. He promises that when we pray according to His will, He hears us.

Scripture goes on to assure us that God will answer (John 15:7). Truly answered prayer brings great joy.

We started a prayer ministry in September 2013. Every day for three hours we give praise and thanksgiving, seek the presence of the Holy Spirit, and offer confession. There are 30 minutes of personal requests, 45 minutes for the nations, and 45 minutes for our host country in Central Asia.

I don't have any desire to boast about this meeting. I'd just like to boast of the faithfulness of our heavenly Father. He promised, "ask of Me and I will give you the nations" (Psalm 2:8). I am reminded of this promise every day because of the emphasis on intercession. God's answer with asphalt was just a small example of what He can do and what He wants to do. We are learning, through prayer, that much prayer produces greater confidence in God. We are also learning about God's heart for the nations. Not one of them escapes His attention.

Bible Quiz Team Begins 10th Season



On Wednesday, August 27, the Bible Quiz team began its 10th season since being restarted in the fall of 2005. That first year saw five youth commit to the ministry and be involved through the majority of that year. WFMC took one team to Bible Quiz Finals at the conclusion of that first season.

Ten years later, the ministry began its decadal season with a record-high 38 youth indicating interest and coming to the first few practices. At the end of October, the Quiz Team has completed two months of the season, including two quiz meets, and 32 quizzers remain an active part of the ministry. In addition to the 32 quizzers currently involved, nine adults volunteer to ensure the ministry remains viable and successful. Below are the results of the first two monthly competitions:

The first monthly meet of the 2014-15 Bible Quiz season was held at the Aldersgate FMC in Indianapolis, IN, on Saturday, October 4, 2014. This meet included teams from the Wabash, Gateway, and New South Conferences of the FMC. Wilmore took 11 teams, consisting of 35 quizzers, in the following divisions, with the trophy positions indicated in parentheses:

Senior Teen Veteran A - 2 teams (1st & 2nd places)
 Senior Teen Veteran B - 1 team (2nd place)
 Young Teen Veteran A - 4 teams (1st & 2nd places)
 Young Teen Veteran B - 1 team
 All-Rookie (all 1st-year quizzers) - 3 teams (1st & 2nd places)
