Thanksgiving is the acknowledgement of the truth that, indeed, every good and perfect thing does come from God (James 1:17.)

And isn't Christmas really the ultimate example of God providing a good and perfect "thing" in Jesus and the possibility of salvation and redemption that was born with Him?

I'm not at all appealing to the pagan idea of yin and yang here, but there is, in

fact, always a bit of Christmas in Thanksgiving, just as there is certainly a bit of Thanksgiving in Christmas.

So maybe these two holidays are intertwined more than we realize.

Which means, maybe it's OK to have gourds and pumpkins displayed along with trees and garlands.


Maybe the oranges and yellows don't really clash all that badly with the reds and greens.

Praying on the Lord's Day

Picture a three-year-old boy dancing around in a long-sleeve shirt a few sizes still too big for him. It doesn't look like what he initially envisioned. Any hope that he would somehow quickly grow tall enough to make them fit has fizzled away. He, instead, realizes how awkward he appears in the mirror and to his parents.

The act of praying on the Lord's Day—more than I care to admit—has felt like moving around in clothes too big for me. Formulaically reciting a liturgical prayer doesn't convey how I truly wish to express the difficult lament in my heart. Singing an unfamiliar hymn can feel disingenuous as if I am going through the motions. Even a thoughtfully prepared prayer of the people can sound distant and unrelatable to my urgent circumstances. Fellow believers—who have not grown up with liturgy, are more accustomed to singing contemporary praise songs, and prefer extemporaneous prayers—have empathetically expressed similar frustrations. Surely, God must notice how long the sleeves on my arms are.

Gradually and thankfully though, I've come to appreciate how all the prayers in their various forms—read aloud, said in silence, recited through liturgy, sung with hymns, and chimed with bells, etc.—and prepared in advance, invariably lead God's people to a worshipful posture because they articulate biblical truths and deeply felt sentiments that I would have trouble expressing all on my own. Regardless of where my heart may be and what I may be feeling, anytime attentive and meaningful prayer takes place—thanks to our worship leaders (but even in solitude and in the quotidian activities of our homes)—the body of Christ finds itself before the presence of God in a space that takes shape because of the triune God's open and standing invitation. In turn, as J. Gerald Janzen puts it, we find ourselves "dancing in !

time to the rhythms of eternity."

I sense the Holy Spirit's gentle nudge, a holy invitation into his divine presence with the call to worship. Slowly but surely, the prayers said and sung assist me to assume a humility that can receive from the one above—an attitude

that is not naturally exercised left to my own devices. Thus, when prayer takes place, I am constantly learning about God, his created world, and my duties in relation to them. Prayer illumines my soul's deepest longing for God's holy presence, the gift of shalom freely given through Christ, the subsequent calling to love my neighbors, and the work of stewardship towards his creation. In this way, God helps me to grow in prayer. It isn't always pretty or easy, but thank God that he controls the rhythm and leads me according to his rhythmic stride.

Regardless how we perceive prison ministry or the validity of inmate responses to religion, the church serves as a continuing source of grace and hope for those who truly desire to change their lives. Even when prisoners refuse to respond to the gospel, the church remains a positive influence and call to every sinner because it offers forgiveness and a new life in Jesus Christ.
