Clearing the Lines

The house my family lives in was built in 1968, which means it's over 55 years old. In our day and age, it qualifies

Why is that anyway?) But back to the point...old drain pipes like ours sometimes need cleaned out so that the water can flow. That can be done in a variety of ways...all of which I've tried; but let me tell you my favorite: a garden hose and a rag.

for the seniors' discount. It could belong to AARP!

But like many things that are over 55, it has its share of physical issues. Parts of it are wearing out. These last few years we've replaced, among other items, windows, flooring, heating systems and the chimney. Technically, the roof was replaced too, but that was done courtesy of our insurance company.

Currently, one place where our home is showing its age is in its plumbing...and particularly the drains. Getting the water in is no problem. Getting the water out, however, through 55 year old metal drain pipes can be challenging.

The problem is in the joints (hey, another senior citizen issue!) The joints where steel drain pipes thread together can have sharp or rough edges, which are perfect places for things like soap, rust, toothpaste and hair (but not mine) to collect, and as those things build up in the joints, they cause the pipes to clog.

This doesn't happen so easily with newer plastic (PVC or ABS) pipe. The joints are much smoother, leaving fewer places for contaminants to get caught and gather. But clogs are common in homes with steel drains like ours.

(Can I say here too, parenthetically, that pipes always seem to clog at the most inopportune times, don't they? Like when company is about to arrive, or when you simply don't have time to deal with them. Last summer, our shower drain clogged the

Now granted...this won't work on some drains because of vent systems and the location of the blockage, but it works great on our shower drain. I cleared the drain this way before I flew to Africa and I just did it again today – right before I started writing this. I bring the hose in through the bathroom window, stick the nozzle into the drain, stuff the rag around it and pull the trigger, and the water pressure does the rest. It's like giving my shower drain an enema. It's so much easier than using a snake and way cheaper than calling a plumber.

So why am I writing all this for the Plumbline? Well, it struck me as I was admiring the water freely draining in the shower just a moment ago: sometimes our spiritual lines get clogged and need cleaned out too. Junk can get hung up on the rough edges of our spiritual pipes and before you know it, nothing spiritually good is flowing in our lives.

Lots of things can cause this: someone at church says something dumb and we get offended, we hold a grudge, we don't get what we prayed for, we get caught up in some bad habit or sinful thinking, and on and on. One thing leads to (and clings to) another and pretty soon, we are all clogged up.

So...how do we clear the clog and get the spiritual water flowing again in our lives? Certainly there are different ways, but one great way is participating in our Spring Renewal services at the end of this month. Think of those five worship

services (that we have in four days) as a pressurized injection of new, spiritual water. They are an intensive time with God and His word that can clear the clogs so the water can once again flow freely...so communion and communication with God might be open and free and unhindered by the build up of junk in our joints.

Because pipes do clog. Every pipe is liable to, sooner or later.

We're so glad that our own Vic Hamilton will be bringing God's word to us in those days. If you don't know him, you'll find more about him elsewhere in this issue.

But please pray for him, for that time for us all, and especially for your own relationship with God. Are things between you and God flowing freely? Blockages are neither fun nor beneficial...especially spiritual ones. God has much to say and much He'd like to do in and through all of us. But there has to be clear channels...clean pipes.

So our prayer might be, as Keith Green once sang, "Rushing wind blow through this temple; blowing out the dust (or clogs) within..."

The Prayer of Jabez

Throughout God's word, there are several models and principles of prayer given to us to enhance and strengthen our prayer life.

The prayer of Jabez is one of the shortest but most powerful prayers recorded in scripture. All that we know about Jabez is that he was an honorable man. His prayer is found in 1st Chronicles 4:10. "And Jabez called upon the God of Israel, saying, Oh that You would bless me indeed, and enlarge my territory, and that Your hand would be with me, and that You would keep me from evil that I might not cause pain, so God granted him his request."

Jabez Prayed for Four Things

1. **Oh, that You would bless me, indeed:** The "oh" gives us a sense of urgency in his prayer. The Bible states many times that God wants to bless us and Jabez was praying, "oh that You would richly bless me" with your choice of blessings.
2. **Enlarge my territory:** In a spiritual context, Jabez could have been revealing a heart that hungered for more of God. Are we satisfied with the status quo of our relationship with God? Not Jabez! He wanted the boundaries moved. He wanted a larger capacity to love and serve God. He wanted God to do something new and fresh in his life.
3. **That your hand be with me:** Throughout Scripture, the hand of God meant the power of God, as in Isaiah 59:1, Joshua 4:24, and 1 Peter

5:6. Also, the reference to the hand of God meant the presence of God, see Acts 11:21 and Ezekiel 37:1. Jabez knew he would never be the person God wanted him to be without the power and presence of God's Spirit in his life.

4. **Keep me from evil:** Jabez knew he was human and had weaknesses and faults; he knew if he wanted God to bless him, to expand his spiritual boundaries and to feel God's power and presence in his life, he had to be kept from evil. To get the proper understanding and appreciation of this prayer tucked away in 1 Chronicles and how it can change our lives when earnestly prayed, perhaps it should be rewritten into our present language.

Father (1) May Your choice of blessings on my life be so significant that only You can receive the glory and honor. (2) It is my prayer that my spiritual life will be enlarged and that my witness for You will be felt in my home, church, community and around the world. (3) May I live my life in such a Godly way that I will feel a fresh touch of Your power and presence in my life. (4) May I not yield to temptation so that I may not cause pain to You, myself or others. Amen

As we open a new calendar for this year, may we make this prayer part of our prayer life in 2024.

Spring Renewal Week

This year's Spring Renewal Week, February 25 through 28, we look forward to the presentation of the Word of God by Vic Hamilton. Vic is a world-class scholar and preacher with a genuinely soft and humble heart toward God. We set all other activities of the church aside for these four days in an effort to give God space in our lives to speak a new word to us. If you'll do the same, you will not be disappointed.

The following service schedule will be followed:

- ◆ Sunday morning, 8:30 and 11:00am
- ◆ Sunday Evening, 6:00pm
- ◆ Monday through Wednesday 7:00pm

Nursery will be available for children through age 2 for the entire services.

Older children (ages 3 through 6) will be dismissed midway through the services to their own story time.

Our friend and brother in Christ, Dr. Victor Hamilton, was professor of Old Testament studies at Asbury College (now Asbury University) for 36 years, and following retirement, served as scholar in residence for five years. Vic's degrees include a BA from Houghton College; a BD and ThM from Asbury Theological Seminary; and an MA and PhD in Mediterranean Studies from Brandeis University. His special areas of interest in the classroom are Pentateuch, Jeremiah, preaching from the Old Testament and Old Testament theology.

Vic has published many books, articles and commentaries on the Old Testament which are widely used and translated into other languages. Vic also served on the translation team for two modern Bible versions, and has written notations for several of the most popular study Bibles and Bible dictionaries.

Vic has enjoyed the privilege of lecturing and preaching at a number of other college campuses, as well as speaking in churches, retreats, pastors' seminars, family conferences, camp meetings, and overseas in Korea, Japan, Jamaica, China, and most recently in Russia. Among his highest joys has been the opportunity to preach over a hundred times in the chapel service in Hughes Auditorium at Asbury University, and at least once a year for 40 consecutive years stretching from 1972 to 2012. For the last 40 years he has preached (through an interpreter) one Sunday a month at the Lexington Chinese Christian Church.

Vic and his wife Shirley have been married for 58 years, and have four married children and thirteen grandchildren (four grandsons, nine granddaughters). Both Vic and Shirley were born and raised in Toronto, Ontario, and have dual citizenship, Canadian and American. Vic is ordained in the Wesleyan Church (Central Canada District). He and his wife Shirley have their membership in the Milliken Wesleyan Church in Markham and have been attending the Wilmore Free Methodist Church for nearly 20 years.



Pray the Word Together

Growing ever closer to God and walking in His ways must be more than a passing resolution. For the Christian it is a lifelong pursuit fueled by love, the love of which God is the source. Staying in touch with Him through prayer and His Word is so very important. With that truth before us, the prayer team is planning a new prayer adventure for 2024. Building on some rewarding outreaches in the past, our focus this year is to offer more structure, fresh content, and delightful simplicity. To assist us in these aims, for the winter season, we have selected a tried and vetted 31 day prayer guide, *Pray the Word; 31 Prayers That Touch the Heart of God* (by Tiece L. King). It is a concise but powerful collection of 31 scripture based prayers. The subtitle *Prayers that Touch the Heart of God*, captures the essence of the work: prayer focused on growing in love and devotion to our magnificent God.

Pray the Word is made up of first person prayers approximately one page in length. Therefore one can pray each prayer word-for-word as perhaps a kickoff to daily devotions, as a timely God moment inserted anywhere in your day, or as an outline for a longer season of prayer. In the latter case, one will find helpful the scripture references linked to each day's selection. The clarity and flexibility of a resource like Pray the Word means that no one should feel intimidated about being a part of this four week journey. Just like the Christian walk itself, Jesus begins with us wherever we are.

Here are just a few particulars:

- The vision is that we start this together on the same date, so that each person is praying the same prayer on the same day.
- The actual start date is still being determined, so please stay alert to worship announcements, PNN, and the church website over the next couple weeks.
- The prayer team has several dozen copies of the book on hand, but we truly hope to order more.
- We'd like to create a simple roster of all who choose to participate.
- If you care to indicate your early interest or simply have questions you can email or call Margaret Dargan or Lee Taylor.
- For any that prefer the E-read option, I noticed that the Kindle version is very inexpensive.

So please resolve now to be a part of Pray The Word 2024, and anticipate where God will bring us.
